

500 Blood Donors Are Required At Summerside

Plans are now completed for a mammoth Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic to be held at St. Mary's Hall in Summerside on Tuesday evenings, May 30 and 31 when 500 donors are desperately needed.

Mr. W. A. Currie, chairman of the Blood Donor Clinic for the Summerside Red Cross, said last night that this was the largest number of donors that the surrounding districts had been requested to produce and is a challenge which he is sure can be met if everyone will accept it as a personal responsibility. Mr. Currie went on to explain that P.E.I. is now over 1000 bottles in debt to the Maritime Blood Transfusion Depot in Halifax as a result of the epidemic and the continued usage of an average of 250 bottles of blood per month for patients in our Island hospitals.

Every day blood transfusions dramatically save lives—particularly those who are severely injured in accidents, those who have severe hemorrhage, jaundiced babies whose blood must be replaced immediately after birth, those who have operations which cannot be performed without blood to replace that lost during the operation. Blood must also be used in a great many cases as therapy which lessens the pain of hospitalization and convalescence and makes it possible for the patient to resume his normal life.

Driver Escapes When Car Wrecked In Accident

Sterling Cotton of Springhill, near Mt. Pleasant, driver and only occupant of the green Ford sedan above escaped with only superficial abrasions to the face and slight injury to the chest when his car left the Trans Canada Highway about one mile east of Crapaud shortly before midnight on Thursday. Seen above shortly after the accident, the wrecked car is shown where it landed upside down in the ditch with the hood and engine bonnet bent and twisted, the rear window smashed out, the trunk cover ripped off, the front of the car extensively damaged and the seats thrown about in the interior. Mr. Cotton, a steam shovel operator for Curran and Briggs Ltd., presently working on the Trans Canada Highway east of Bonshaw, was en route to his boarding house in that area when the accident occurred. Dr. Peter MacDonald of Crapaud was called to the scene and administered medical attention to the injuries sustained by the driver. Members of the Borden detachment of the RCMP investigated the accident.

Contract Is Let For New Kensington High School

An announcement that the contract for the construction of the new Kensington High School has been let to the M. F. Schurman Co., Ltd., who submitted the lowest tender, was made last evening by the Kensington School Trustees of which Austin Fenderson is chairman and committee members are Ron Kennedy and Roy MacArthur. Construction is to begin next Monday and the completion date is early September to be in readiness for the new school term.

The site of the new High School is in the northwest section of the town on the overlooking the community and on the same street as the present school. The land on which the building will be erected was purchased from Patterson Walker.

The new, modern school will provide facilities for 150 students in grades nine to twelve not only from Kensington but the surrounding communities as well. It will contain six classrooms and in addition there will be a science laboratory, teachers room, kitchen and auditorium which will seat approximately 450 people. The building will be of brick-steel construction with concrete floors and is to be 50 x 110 feet. Glass blocks will be used extensively to provide adequate natural lighting facilities.

Construction of the new school was decided on at an open meeting called by the School Board last March, due to the inadequate accommodation provided by the present school.

The architect who prepared the drawings for the High School is Keith Pickard B. Arch of Summerside.

Court Cases At Alberton

—There were eleven cases on the docket at the Alberton Court House yesterday with Magistrate R. S. Hinton presiding.

Solicitor General

Once a sense of human dignity has been recovered, the battle is won. We, in our small way, are struggling to overcome these difficulties. Without your help it is of no avail. Together, we cannot fail to succeed.

DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIES

In his opening remarks Mr. MacDonald explained that the Department of Justice carries on a wide variety of activities connected with the administration of justice in Canada. "For instance," he said, it prepares all government legislation introduced in Parliament. It conducts all civil litigation in which the Government of Canada is involved. It prepares legal opinions for other government departments. It administers a number of Acts of Parliament, such as the Bankruptcy Act and the Combines Investigation Act. As Solicitor General I am responsible for the administration of the Remission Service of the Department and it is the work of that Service about which I propose to talk to you tonight.

"Since the dawn of civilization, and indeed even in uncivilized states, the Sovereign has always enjoyed sweeping prerogatives. In the emergence and development of the modern democratic state as we know it today, these prerogatives have been reduced by Parliament and the Legislature until virtually only one great prerogative remains. That is the royal prerogative of mercy. In Canada, the Governor General exercises this prerogative on behalf of Her Majesty.

"I have no doubt that it will come as no surprise to the persons here tonight when I say that I accept the Governor General's constitutional practice requires the advice of one of the Ministers of the Crown. In our country, where the royal prerogative of mercy is concerned, that advice is given to the Governor General by the Solicitor General except in those cases where a person has been sentenced to death, and then the advice is given by the Cabinet.
