Reds Arrest Tibetans For Slave Labor Camps

KALIMPONG, India (Reuters) — Chinese Communists Wednesday were reported rounding up Tibetans by the thousands—including 5,000 to 10,000 from Lhasa, the capital—and herding them off in trucks apparently to forced labor camps.

At the same time the Chinese were reported abducting thousands of troops into Tibet in an all-out effort to crush the revolt that broke out in Lhasa March 10.

Reports reaching this Indian frontier town from the remote mountain country said the Chinese started their mass roundup after suppressing the Lhasa rebellion.

HEAD OFF DALAI LAMA

The Chinese also are trying to head off the Dalai Lama, Tibet's spiritual leader who fled Lhasa March 17 and is reported on his way to the Indian border.

More than 50,000 Chinese troops have blocked almost every known route out of Tibet and are engaged in one of the greatest man-hunts in history to seize the Tibetan ruler.

After suppressing the Lhasa revolt the Chinese dissolved the Tibetan government and imposed military rule.

RESTRICT CONSUL

Another report said latest Chinese restrictions on the movements of India's consulate-general staff in Lhasa have literally confined the consul-general and all members of his staff to the consulate grounds.

Tibetans expect the Dalai Lama to cross the Indian frontier safely any day. He was believed to be moving only at night on his 200-mile trek through the roadless and mountainous Lhoka region.

The region borders on Bhutan and on India's northeast frontier province.

Israeli Units Are Called Up

JERUSALEM (CPz) — The Israeli Radio caused a rash of excitement Wednesday night when it broadcast an order calling up three reserve units of the Israeli army for service. An army spokesman later said the callup was a "routine exercise."

Elsewhere diplomatic sources said that Syria interrupted regular radio programs in Damascus during the evening to order all Syrian military personnel on leave to return to duty. The Syrian order was regarded as a precautionary move prompted by the Israeli callup.

Ch'town Man Is Remanded

A Charlottetown man charged with attempted arson had his case adjourned after one witness was heard in City Police Court yesterday morning. The case will continue this morning.

The lone Crown witness, a night watchman for the City Retail Merchants, told the court that while making his nightly rounds on the night of March 19 he observed a flickering light in the gangway between Kelly and MacInnis and Sherwin-Williams stores on Great George Street.

Upon investigation he found the Kelly and MacInnis store to be afire and observed the accused standing some two feet from the blaze. He said he extinguished the fire, questioned the accused and then went for police.

Under cross examination he said he thought the accused had appeared to be drinking.

R. R. Bell, Q.C. is defence counsel.

A Central Railway man, charged with theft of a quantity of gasoline valued at less than \$50 had his case adjourned until April 8th. The accused pleaded guilty.

A fine of \$50 and costs or 20 days was levied a city man charged with operating a motor vehicle while his licence to do so was cancelled.

Another Charlottetown man was fined \$5 and costs or two days for operating a motor vehicle without marker plates.

A city man was sentenced to a 20-day jail term when he appeared on a charge of being drunk and incapable. Two other persons appearing on similar charges, residents of Mount Stewart and Covehead, drew fines of \$5 and costs or two days.

Failure to stop at a red traffic light cost a Souris resident a fine of \$10 and costs or five days.

Alcoholics Said To Be Increasing

Donald R. Gilchrist, director of Temperance Education for the Province of Nova Scotia, was the guest speaker at a meeting of the P.E.I. Temperance Federation held at the Dominion Building, Charlottetown, last night.

The speaker noted a steady increase in the number of alcoholics each year, particularly in Ontario where he said the increase was 11 per cent each year. There was a broad and distorted knowledge of alcohol that bordered on the superstitious, he said, which tended to give incorrect ideas regarding the true effect on alcohol.

In explaining a survey which had been conducted in five counties in Nova Scotia, Mr. Gilchrist stated that 67 per cent of the first criminal offenders became offenders due to alcohol. 37 per cent of the children being processed for adoption and 36 per cent of juvenile delinquency was due to alcohol in one or both parents.

At the same meeting reports were heard from Miss Catherine Rogerson, Charlottetown, and Miss Joan Douglas, Cherry Hill, who attended a conference on Temperance in Toronto in December. Miss Rogerson and Miss Douglas were the winners of the provincial contest for an essay on Temperance.
