Councilor Clark Presents Electric Light Dept. Report

SUMMERSIDE — The annual report of Councilor Dr. H. E. Clark, chairman of the Electric Light Committee, said "as most of the area where the Summerside Electric Light Utility operates has previously been serviced there was very little construction in the year 1958. There was a normal increase in the number of customers in both rural and urban areas."

The number of kilowatt hours generated was 3,39,960 purchased 6,889,240, for a total of 10,291,200, an increase of 4.45 percent over 1957. 67.04 percent was the percentage purchased in 1958 as compared to 65.5 percent in 1957.

Peak load registered for the year was 2680 KW, which load occurred December 22nd at 5.30 p.m. This was 210 KW or 8.5 percent than the previous year.

The firm of Engineering Service Limited of Halifax completed their appraisal of the Utility and submitted a schedule of rates for domestic and general service town customers. This was approved by the Town Council and the new rates are designed to give an equitable return from both domestic and general service customers, and although the gross revenue may be down somewhat for a year or two, it is felt that the increased use of electricity, due to the lower energy rate and the prospect of a housing development, will more than make up the difference.

Revenue for the year amounted to \$452,467.68 and the expenditures \$373,879.72, leaving a net surplus of \$78,587.96.
