

Sgt. Percy Landrigan Tops Shamrocks, Lions In Feature Shoot

Registering possible 50's at both the 200 and 500 yard ranges and then adding 68 out of 75 at the 500, Sgt. Percy Landrigan of Charlottetown took top honors in the feature match the Jones Memorial, of the three day annual prize meet conducted at Square Point range by the Provincial Rifle Association.

In the final tally the top marksman of the meet was Tpr. Bob Barwise, who finished in first place in the Ottawa Aggregate with a score of 599 of a possible 630 points. The array of silverware collected through his efforts, in addition to the Governor-General's silver medal for the aggregate included the Snyder Challenge Trophy, the President's rosette, the Navy souvenir, the Recce Souvenir and the souvenir for the second place in the Jones Memorial match.

In the other matches fired Saturday morning the Association match was won by Pte. J. A. Marshall of Picou in a three-way hoot-out with SSM D. O. Clark and Sgt. P. J. Landrigan. An air force man from Summerside, Sgt. V. V. Henshaw captured the first place in the Batt & MacRae Tyro match with a 157 of a possible 175. The Nicholson Tyro Aggregate was won by SSM D. O. Clark who led a three day total of 574.

With the provincial meet over preparations for selection of the team to represent P.E.I. at the Dominion meet which opens in Ottawa on August 8th. Trotter Sets World Record

YONKERS, N.Y. (AP)—John A. Hanover, a speedy son of Hoot Mon, set a world record for three-year-old trotters at the 1:16.197 Saturday in winning the \$56,397 Yonkers Trot by a half-length over the 3-to-5 favorite, Diller Hanover.

John A. Hanover, driven by Stanley Dancer, took the lead at the first turn and was never headed in this race of trotting's triple crown. The colt was clocked in 2:11.1, a second below the previous record, also set at Yonkers, by Scott Frost.

The victory was worth \$31,018.62 to John A. Hanover's owners, Dr. and Mrs. Nicholas Derrier of Pelham Manor, N.Y. The colt previously had won \$14,242.

Hall Stables' previously unbeaten Diller Hanover, driven by Ralph Baldwin, kept pressing the leader, but never was able to get to the front.

Farand Hanover, owned by L. B. Sheppard of Hanover, Pa., and Sanders Russell of Stevenson, Ala., finished third.

HULL, Que. (CP)—Stan Leonard, in a class by himself throughout the tournament, picked up his seventh Canadian Professional Golfers Association championship Saturday with a third sub-par round good for a solid nine-stroke advantage on the big field.

The Vancouver veteran, 46, shot medal-play rounds of 67-70-71. He won \$1,000 cash and an expenses-paid trip on the Caribbean tournament circuit next winter, plus the Seagram Shield, Stender Al Baiding of Markham, Ont., another Canadian who has fared well on the American pro circuit, sneaked into second place worth \$700 at 213 with his third round of 71 and will accompany Leonard on the Caribbean trip.

Third spot and \$600 in the three-day 54-hole tournament—worth a total \$6,725—was taken by Bill Kosak of Niagara Falls, Ont., with a total of 214.
