**FATAL ACCIDENT.**—An old lady, Mrs. Putnam, about 76 years of age, was struck at Beaurepaire, today, by the incoming train due here at 11.30, and sustained internal injuries. Dr. Powell, of Ottawa, who happened to be on the train, was summoned to attend her, and on the arrival of the train at Bonaventure, the General Hospital ambulance was called. On the way to the institution she expired in the ambulance, and the body was then removed to her home at 4021 Dorchester Street.—Montreal Star.

**A SERIOUS ACCIDENT.**—We hear with regret that Mr. Gordon McKay, of Bradalbane, met with an accident at Hunter River last night which caused the loss of one of his legs. It seems that Mr. McKay boarded a special train from Summerside for Charlottetown as it was passing Bradalbane with the intention of getting off at Hunter River. On arrival at Hunter River station, just before the train stopped, Mr. McKay, in alighting, slipped on the wet platform and fell in such a position that one of the wheels of the moving cars passed over his leg crushing it very badly. The unfortunate man was taken on board the train and brought to the Prince Edward Island Hospital, where everything possible was done for him. This morning it was found necessary to amputate the leg above the knee. Mr. McKay is doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances.

**IN MEMORIAM.**

Died at Lower Montague on the 7th day of July, 1897, Mr. James Phillips in the 65th year of his age. Mr. Phillips was one of the most enterprising and progressive farmers in this locality and by his industry and perseverance accumulated considerable means. He was also a successful stock raiser and always succeeded in capturing prizes at the King's County Exhibition. He was shrewd but honest in all his business transactions and will long be missed in the neighborhood in which he spent his lifetime. Some few years ago he sold his farm and purchased a few acres of land at Lower Montague Ferry on which he lived till the time of his death. In politics Mr. Phillips was a strong Conservative, and took an active part in promoting the interests of his party. He leaves behind him a wife, one daughter, two brothers and one sister to mourn the loss of one who was a loving husband, an indulgent parent, an affectionate brother, a kind friend and an obliging neighbor. His remains were interred in the cemetery at Lower Montague there to remain till the resurrection morn.
