As a young man he received certification as a drug clerk and for some years was in the drug store of the late E.A. Foster. Later he was employed with the coal firm of W.D. Gillis for many years before joining the staff of Arncliffe Ltd. Mr. Blanchard is survived by his wife, Mrs. Evelyn (Creighton), and one daughter, Freda, at home, as well as his brothers and six sisters all of this city. The brothers are Cornelius and Albert and the sisters are Ellen, Mrs. Byron Brown, Jean, Mrs. John McAlister, Bessie, Mrs. Joseph Doherty, and Mrs. Mary A. Doherty. A brother, Louis, and a sister, Ida, predeceased him. Mr. Blanchard is resting at his home from where the funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon at 4 p.m. in St. Dunstan's Basilica for Requiem high mass at 9 o'clock. Interment will be in People's cemetery.

### Accreditation Is Awarded To Charlottetown Hospital

Following the survey visit by a representative of the Canadian Council on Hospital Accreditation, made last Aug. 2, the Charlottetown Hospital has been awarded accreditation status. The first objective of the visit was to gather evidence upon which Council could judge whether the hospital merited the award of accreditation. The second important purpose of the survey was education about accreditation. The standards are the same for all Canadian Hospitals but suitable procedures to give effect to Standards should differ in every hospital. During the survey visit, minute books, reports and medical records may be inspected. Board members, medical staff and nursing staff and service department heads are asked to be available for questioning.

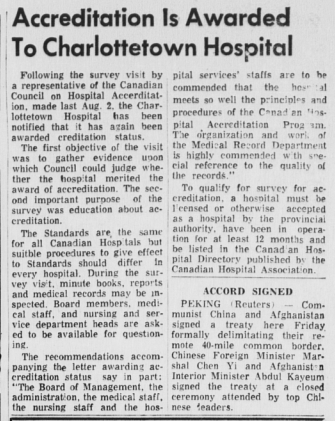

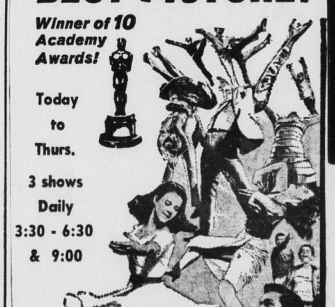
