DELAY OF THE MAILS.

The Council of the Board of Trade held a meeting this forenoon with reference to the long delay upon the mainland of mails and passengers for this province. The meeting adjourned pending the result of enquiries to be made of the secretary of the Steam Navigation Company. It is, we understand, the intention of the Board of Trade to move for an improved service by the Steam Navigation Company or by some other means. A delay of mails and passengers of twenty-one hours will no longer be tolerated by the business men of the Province.

MR. SIFTON AND HIS FRIENDS.

The breach in the Liberal party, extending all over Canada, has lately been accentuated and made public in Manitoba. The annual meeting of the Winnipeg Liberal Association was held last week. At the meeting Mr. Richardson, a Liberal member of Parliament, who has openly rebelled against Mr. Sifton's leadership, took the lead in opposing Mr. Sifton's nominees, with the result that every one of them was defeated. Not only that, but men openly and determinedly opposed to Mr. Sifton were elected to all the leading positions in the association. A brother of Joseph Martin was elected President, and he, we are informed, delivered an address containing "a scathing arraignment of the Minister of Justice." Three rabid anti-Siftonians were, we are told, elected to the position of vice-President. Further,—we quote the Winnipeg Telegram,—

"A resolution was passed ostentatiously congratulating his rival, Mr. Martin on his success in British Columbia, while for Mr. Sifton there was naught but indignant denunciation. A reference to the rejection by the senate of his Yukon railway contract provoked applause. His administration of the Yukon was bitterly condemned. His new personal organ here was repudiated in the name of honest liberalism. His opposition to the interests of Winnipeg was bitterly denounced. His distribution of the patronage was caustically censured. His subserviency to the C P R was angrily inveighed against. For failing to assert his opposition to the St Andrews rapids job, the member for Winnipeg was called upon to resign. Seldom has any public man been so assailed and humiliated by his own party."

It is pleasing to note that honest and economical men in the Liberal party are openly opposing the shady transactions, the hoodling and extravagance, of the Government. We hope, ere long, to see the same spirit exhibited throughout the whole country. Unscrupulous politicians ought to be taught that they cannot do as they like with impunity.

THE CRISIS IN FRANCE.

It was supposed that the opponents of the government in France would have permitted M. Brisson to remain in office until after he had backed down in respect to Fashoda; so that the odium resulting from the settlement of that matter would fall upon the Brisson Cabinet. But the supposition has not been verified. Influenced by the army, the French Chamber of Deputies hastened to give M. Brisson his conge. The motives for this hasty action are very much mixed. It is certain that the French army leaders desire to overawe the Court of Cassation which has the Dreyfus case under review. It is certain that the mob of Paris, moved by the army leaders, is full of the feeling which finds expression in the cry "down with the Jews," and that the mob was infuriated by M. Brisson's action in re-opening the Dreyfus case after it was discovered that the evidence upon which Dreyfus was convicted was forged. But whether or not the forced resignation of M. Bris-

son has the deeper meaning that the French army leaders and their political co-workers desire to fight Great Britain, and to that end have interfered to prevent the withdrawal of Marchand from Fashoda, has not yet appeared. That the Chamber was merely carried away by the fury resulting from the developments in the Dreyfus case seems to be the more reasonable conclusion. France is being played upon by professional patriots, revolutionists, socialists, reactionary leaders, free-lance journalists and sensation-mongers, and at the back of all is the army led by unscrupulous men who prate about honor. What results may proceed from the crisis precipitated on Tuesday last, no man can tell.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Passengers for this province complain very bitterly of being detained at Moncton and Point Duchene for twenty-one hours.

—Heavy loss will be entailed upon farmers, grain companies, railway companies and others on account of the damage done to wheat by recent heavy and continuous rains in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories.

—Mr. J. A. Macdonald, of Hermanville, writes to the Farmer's Advocate to say that "the greatest drawback to Canadian success in swine raising is indiscriminate breeding. There seems to be no idea of type fixed in the minds of our breeders. No doubt a few of our best breeders have a fixed type in mind, but the vast majority have not, and the results of the wholesale indiscriminate are everywhere evident.

—The Guardian argues that we have no right to assume that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will do as his newspaper exponents advise in respect to the wishes of the majority in the prohibition plebiscite. But we incline to the opinion that the newspaper "exponents" are merely setting forth the views of the government and preparing the public with excuses for the government's avoidance of the duty of executing the mandate of the majority as expressed in the plebiscite.

—It is remarked by the Farmer's Advocate that the enterprise shown by the Danes in developing their dairy export trade to Great Britain is most commendable when we consider that the area of Denmark is only 15,000 square miles, or about one-third the area of the State of Pennsylvania. It has only one large city Copenhagen, which has 600,000 of a population. The total number of cattle kept is somewhat more than 2,000,000. The total population of the country numbers about the same as the cattle.

—The recent death of Harold Frederic the journalist, while under the treatment of christian scientists has directed attention to the status of these quacks; and the fact is made clear that the law is powerless to check the imposture. Such, at least, is the case in England, where the Christian scientists, faith healers, and the rest of the brotherhood, are legally entitled to undertake the treatment of patients, either personally or by correspondence, and to fleece their victims to the utmost extent; but with one reservation—a healer is liable to a charge of manslaughter, should a patient die while under treatment. It is reported that those who attended upon Frederic will be indicted for manslaughter.
