Singer Phyllis Marshall In London For T.V. Shows

By SYLVIA HACK Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON (CP)—Toronto blues singer Phyllis Marshall, in London for four television shows, is also acting as an unofficial ambassador of Canadian fashions during her six-week stay.

Dusky-voiced Miss Marshall, who flew to Britain Aug. 5, came accompanied by a Canadian-designed wardrobe worth an estimated £40,000. Her luggage includes five evening gowns, four cocktail dresses, five day dresses, four coats and 12 pairs of shoes, as well as a full-length mink coat, mink jacket, chinchilla jacket, sable stole and white fox.

"I was a bit worried at first having such valuable clothes around," she says. "But I've got used to the idea now."

She doesn't plan to give a mannequin display; the idea of bringing the clothes "is to wear them around to show people what Canadian fashions are like."

Miss Marshall has already displayed some of the clothes on BBC television. She plans to wear the rest during the remainder of her stay, which ends next week.

STARTED WHEN 13 Miss Marshall, 31, the mother of a 13-year-old daughter, Sharon, started singing when she was 13. Two years later she won an ama-

teur contest that brought her a series of radio programs with the CBC. Afterwards she sang with bands and on the radio.

Seven years ago she toured part of the United States with the Cab Calloway orchestra and she later formed a trio of her own in Canada. For the last three seasons she has played in the weekly CBC TV show, Cross - Canada Hit Parade. She also sings at conventions, balls, and charity performances.

Now, she says, she would like to develop an international career "if it can be arranged."

One of the things she misses most—apart from Sharon—is her car.

"It was wonderful to be able to get into my own car at home

and drive where I liked. Here, I get so confused with buses and trains.

"I'm having to do a lot more walking, but it's good for me anyway."

A gala dessert: Pineapple Whipped Cream Roll

Gradually beat in 1 c. granulated sugar

Stir in 1 tsp. grated orange rind 1/2 c. orange juice

Sift in dry ingredients, part at a time, fold lightly. Turn into greased jelly roll pan lined with greased waxed paper. Bake at 375°, 15 mins. Sprinkle towel with fruit sugar. Turn out hot cake on towel; peel off paper, trim edges; roll up in towel. Cool.

Prepare 1/2 c. drained canned crushed pineapple, 1/4 c. toasted coconut, 1 tbsp. chopped maraschino cherries. Soften 1 1/2 tsp. gelatine in 1 tsp. water; melt over hot water. Cool. Beat 1/2 pint whipping cream until thick; add gelatine; beat until stiff. Beat in 2 tbsps. granulated sugar.

Add 1/4 tsp. vanilla or rum flavoring, 1/4 tsp. grated orange rind, prepared fruit, coconut. Unroll cake, spread with filling; re-roll. Chill several hours or overnight. Yield: 8 to 10 slices. For finest baking results use Magic.

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
