Montague School Board To Expropriate Land

At a special meeting of the Montague Board of School Trustees yesterday, it was decided to expropriate the north portion of the Community Welfare League grounds as a new school site. This action was taken by the trustees following a special meeting of the directors of the league earlier this week at which it was moved that the land be sold at 10¢ than \$100,000.00. Considering such a price somewhat exorbitant, the trustees have invoked the power of the School Act, section 47, sub 2, which reads that "the board of trustees may, with the approval of the Minister, lay out such school lot of grounds up to a maximum of five acres". The trustees have now the approval of the Minister in writing to lay out the site for the new school.

Also in support of this action there was read the act to incorporate the Community Welfare League of Montague passed in 1921. This act sets forth the aims of the league which are as follows: "The league shall be non-sectarian, non-political and non-profit sharing to its individual members, and shall have for its objects the benefit and welfare of the town of Montague, its citizens, and the community at large."

"By developing a community spirit among its citizens. "By using its influence towards the betterment of the town schools in the matter of buildings, grounds and equipment, that will tend towards the intellectual, physical and social advancement of the pupils."

"By the purchase of lands to provide sites for public buildings, industrial and commercial establishments and residences. "By providing ways and means in such a manner as by it may be deemed advisable for the carrying out of these objects."

It is proposed to have a detailed plan of the grounds drawn up, and for this purpose a surveyor will be brought here in the very near future to complete this task.
