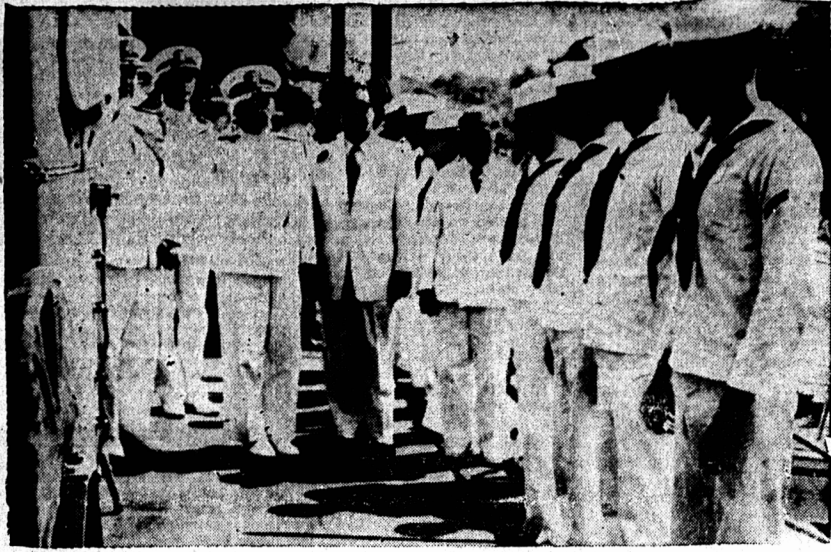

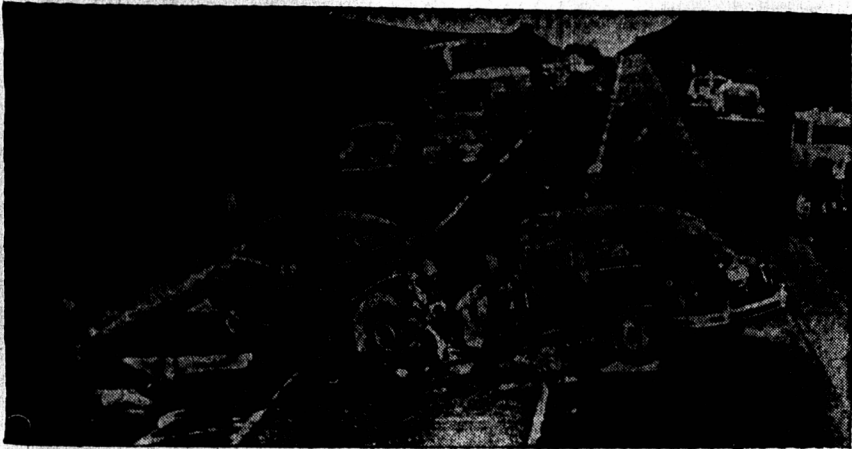

Emperor Bao Dai (wearing dark glasses), who is recognized as the ruler of French Indo-China by France and the western powers, is shown being received aboard the U. S. destroyer Stickle recently. Beside him, saluting, is Admiral Berkeley. The appearance of the Stickle and another U. S. warship on the Saigon river precipitated a riot by Communist elements which resulted in the death of two persons, injuries to 40 and damage running into the millions. Indo-China is presently the scene of fierce jungle warfare between French colonial troops and loyal natives on one hand and Communists under the leadership of Ho-Chi Minh, who has the support of the present Chinese government and Russia.



Robert Bixby and his wife, Dianna Cyrus Bixby, are shown climbing aboard their twin-engine plane at San Francisco airport to begin their attempt to better the 75-hour record made by the late Bill Odom for round-the-world flight. They are flying a converted British Mosquito bomber. Their first scheduled re-fueling stop is at Newark, N. J. The route they have charted will take them over 21,000 miles.



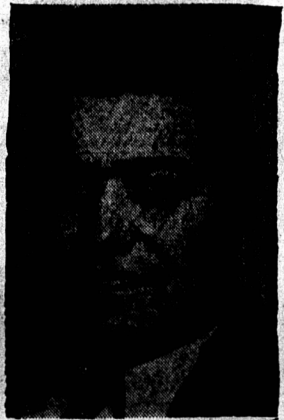

Driving on this flooded street in Long Branch was quite a problem which only amphibious vehicles could have solved. Driver of this truck and of car following just kept on going, hoping that the flooded waters would not put a sudden halt to their operations. An early thaw has sent the Etobicoke River, in Long Branch, Ont., on the rampage again. Already many homes, streets are flooded and more damage is expected as forecast of warmer weather and intermittent rain is expected to bring a rise in the flood waters.

WANTS BARTER TRADE — Fisheries Minister Mayhew indicated in the House of Commons that he believes at least a partial solution to Canada's trade problems may be found through barter deals with non-dollar countries. Stressing that he was speaking as a private member, not as a cabinet minister, Mr. Mayhew suggested that a national export-import corporation be established to barter mixed Canadian merchandise for mixed imports from non-dollar countries.



Firefighting launches designed to replace E. A. F. tenders now in use for fighting seaplane and marine craft blazes are demonstrated in Portsmouth harbor. Larger one, of aluminum, is 80 feet long, while smaller, 55 feet long, is made of mild steel. Main features include greater manoeuvrability and increased firefighting capacity, and lower decks to permit craft to pass under seaplane wings. They throw 5,400 gallons of foam per minute.



Mired knee-deep in a cold, wet, sucking mudbog near Pringle's creek at Whitby, Ont., for more than half an hour, Mary Ann Hardy, nine, was dragged from the mud by firemen wearing hip-rubber boots after several passers-by had failed to rescue the frightened girl. Her mother, Mrs. Edgar Hardy, arrived soon after firemen. She was called by Robert Whitney, six, a playmate of the girl, who ran to the Hardy home after he could not get the girl out of the mud.



MAN EATEN BY DOG — The body of John Wasman, 77-year-old North York pensioner, was found by police in his Weston, Ont., shack almost completely devoured by one of two dogs he had locked in with him. One dog was dead in the shack when police gained entry. They shot the other to gain entry. Police said the dog died from starvation. They said he apparently would not eat the body of his master. "The place was completely wrecked," police said. They did not know whether Wasman had battled with the dogs or had died and then one had eaten his master's body, from hunger. Only bones were left on the floor near the stove. There were also blood stains. Dog who ate Wasman was doberman of the type shown above.



Watching from window in neighbor's home, 10-year-old Aubrey Watson, shown here with family pet, "Rex" saw his sister and niece killed, on a Toronto street, by two-ton truck that sped away and evaded pursuers.



A police cruiser arrived on the scene while grief-stricken Charles Watson, grandfather of one of the girls, was attempting to give first aid to his granddaughter, Barbara Jones, who was still breathing. Rushed to hospital she was dead on arrival. Body of Barbara, covered by blankets, is on side of road near police car. Barbara, six, and her aunt, Lorraine Watson, 14, were on way to Lenten service when struck down.
