The Flyers went into a 1-0 lead in the third game as Brian Lewis singled, advanced to second on a throwing error and scored on Kip Ready's liney into right. They added another in the fourth without a hit as the Dodgers fell apart at the seams and committed four miscues.

The Dodgers could manage only three bingles off the deliveries of Kip Ready while the Flyers were blasting away at Squarebriggs for eight.

Brian Lewis, Kip Ready and Bernie Gallant each had a pair of singles in three trips and Stanley and Devine had one blow apiece.

Kennedy, McCallum and Whitlock got the Dodger hits.

Kennedy and Stanley made the fielding gems of the game. Kennedy ran a country mile to pull down Gallant's high foul and Stanley crashed into the screen as he made a great catch of Whitlock's towering foul.

# Joe Collins Blasts Pair Of Homers To Give Yanks Win; Chicago Edges Boston

NEW YORK (AP) — Joe Collins belted his second home run of the game with one out in the 10th inning Tuesday night, breaking up a 1-1 tie and giving New York a 2-1 victory over Cleveland, lifting the Yankees out of a second place tie with the Indians in the blistering American League race.

Collins' first shot had pulled the Yanks into the 1-1 tie with the Tribe in the first inning. From then on, it was a tight pitching battle between New York's Tommy Byrne and Cleveland's Early Wynn.

The Tribe got its run in the top of the first when Al Smith led off with a triple and came home on Bobby Avila's sacrifice fly.

BALTIMORE (AP)—The four-hit pitching of Bill Wight, who also had a single and a run-producing double, plus four Kansas City errors, gave Baltimore Orioles a 5-1 victory over the Athletics Tuesday night.

BOSTON (AP)—Chicago's Dixie Howell, second relief pitcher of the team, retired veteran Eddie Joost with the potential tying run on third base Tuesday night to preserve a 2-1 victory over Boston and keep the White Sox on top in the torrid American League pennant race.

Pinchhitter Fay Thronberry had just tripled in a Boston run with two out in the ninth when manager Marty Marion called on Howell. Jim Busby hauled in Howell's fly ball that ended the game.

Connie Johnson, 32-year-old righthander hurling his fourth victory in five decisions since his June 30 recall from Toronto, was within one out of a complete game when Morrie Martin came in to face Thronberry.

The fourth-place Red Sox now are four games behind.

Jim Rivera hit his sixth homer for what proved the winning Chicago run.

## Canada's Chances In Title Race Soar As Americans Eliminated At Calgary

CALGARY (CP) — Canada's chances of fielding its first winner in the Canadian amateur golf championship since 1951 soared Tuesday when only five Americans survived second-round match play at the Calgary Country Club.

Of the 12 U. S. players who started, two were knocked out in the first round Monday and another five were sidelined Tuesday.

Most of the favorites advanced with ease Tuesday as the field was cut to 32 players for today's third round. Fourth and fifth rounds will be played Thursday with the 36-hole semi-finals scheduled Friday.

## Ezzard Charles Fights Tonight

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — Ezzard Charles, 34, former heavyweight champion, pits his punch and boxing skill against the youth and swarming style of Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson tonight in a 10-round match.

Off the record books, this is strictly no contest between a good body puncher with proven boxing ability and an awkward youngster who has had only 26 fights. But age and Jackson's stamina narrow the gap so that the Hurricane has a solid chance of winning. The odds favor Charles at 12-5.

Jackson and Charles will be close in the weight. Charles at 193 and Jackson 194.

Charles is the No. 6 contender and Jackson No. 3 behind Archie Moore and Bob Baker.

Father Clarence Roche racked up his eighth win against 2 losses as he hurried the lucky clubbers to their victory, and Dick Doyle took the loss for the Navy.

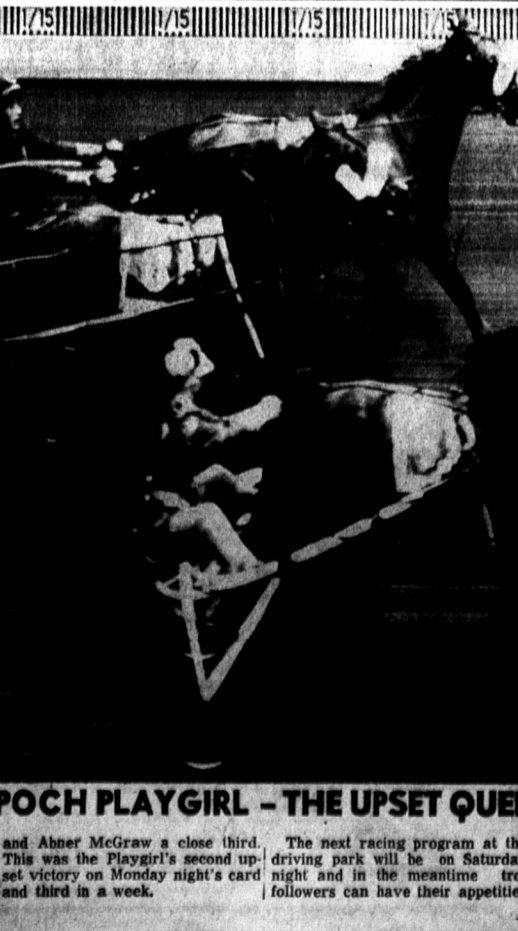
Ralph Pineau led all batters at the plate with 3 hits in four trips and Ivan Connors played an outstanding game defensively for the losers.
