

Farm Products And Prices

The following market report has been compiled by the P.E.I. Department of Agriculture:

There is a fair supply of good quality grain available in this Province for seed and the farmer who is contemplating buying seed oats this spring should make sure of his requirements as soon as possible. The grades of seed oats are as follows: Registered No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3; Certified No. 1 and No. 2; Commercial Grades No. 1 seed, No. 2 seed and No. 3 seed.

Registered No. 1 seed oats does not contain any noxious weed seeds at all, and only a total of three weed seeds of all kinds per pound, and the germination must be 85%.

Certified No. 1 must not contain any primary noxious weed seeds, and only three secondary noxious weed seeds per peck — or a total of ten weed seeds per pound.

No. 1 seed oats will contain no primary noxious weed seeds, and not more than one secondary noxious weed seed per pound, with a total of 25 weed seeds per pound. Germination in these three grades must be at least 85%.

No. 3 seed oats is the lowest grade that you can have named, and this grade may contain three primary noxious weed seeds, or a total of 15 primary and secondary noxious weed seeds, with a grand total of 100 weed seeds per pound. The minimum germination for No. 3 seed is 65%.

In late reports from the West Manitoba expects that the demand for seed for spring planting will be heavy. A report from Saskatchewan states that the germination in oats is very poor, and as a result large quantities will be lost as far as distributions for seed is concerned. We do know that seed stocks in the West are scarce this year, and anything that can possibly be cleaned up to a seed grade will be cleaned up and sold for seed. We have already had a certain amount of oats brought into this Province advertised as double re-cleaned and choice double re-cleaned, but with neither grade a nor variety named. As I mentioned previously the minimum germination for No. 3 seed oats is 65%, but I have seen records of samples of the double re-cleaned and choice double re-cleaned where the germination was as low as 38%. This germination would reject the sample for a grade, but it could also be rejected on account of an excessive number of weed seeds.

In buying double re-cleaned oats you have no indication of variety, whereas in your graded seed you have assurance of variety in Registered and Certified, and a good indication of variety in Commercial No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3.

As a service to farmers the Department of Agriculture would be very glad to list the names of those who have grain for sale, and that would be suitable for seed, and if we had such a list we would then be in a position to advise those who wanted seed as to where they might procure their requirements. So, if anyone has grain for sale kindly let us know and if you are in the market for seed this spring drop us a line and we will try to put you in contact with someone who would be in a position to fill your requirements.

DAIRYING

The price of butter continues unchanged in the three Maritime Provinces compared with those of last week. On the Halifax and Saint John markets the wholesale price of first grade prints is being quoted at 63 cents per pound delivered, with local jobbing 65 cents delivered. The wholesale price in this Province is the same as that of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, less freight and handling charges, and the local jobbing price is 65 cents for first grade prints delivered.

Montreal butter current receipts are quoted at 61 cents, wholesale 61-61½ cents, Toronto 61-61½.

The production of butter in this Province for the week ending March 5 amounted to 37,552 lbs., compared with 47,058 lbs. for the same week last year. This is a decrease of 9,506 lbs., or 20.2%.

The manufacture of butter in the three Maritime Provinces during the month of February amounted to 646,000 lbs., compared with 790,000 lbs. for the same month last year, a decrease of 144,000 lbs., or 18.2%. There were 949,000 lbs. of butter moved out of storage during the month of February.

POTATOES

The potato market, especially as far as tablestock is concerned, has not improved very much since our last report. The price being quoted today is \$1.40 for the contents of a 75 pound bag

delivered to the car and both the movement and demand is very light. Seed appears to be in fairly good demand, and since our last broadcast 49,580 bushels have been shipped from this Province. Turnips are worth 40 cents per bushel at the car today. This is a bit of a flurry at the present time, caused mostly by a bare market in Boston.

THE EGG MARKET

The egg market is practically unchanged from our last report. Demand is somewhat easier due to carlot shipments to other Atlantic Provinces and Ontario. Charlottetown dealers report some light surplus over demand. Production is steadily increasing.

LIVESTOCK

Trading in cattle has been active on the Montreal market with mixed Good and Choice Steers being quoted at 20-21; mixed Medium and Good 19-19.50; Medium 17-19. Good Beef Type Cows 13-13.75, with a few bringing 14. Good Dairy Type Cows 12-13, with Medium 11-12. Good Bulls 13-14, with a few at 14.75.

In the Maritimes hog prices are down 25 cents, with sows being steady at Moncton and Charlottetown. Steers and heifers are also revised downward at Charlottetown.

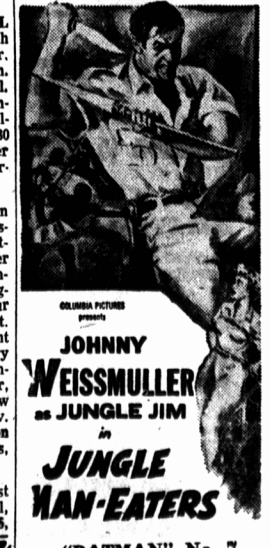
PLEDGES SUPPORT
