West led the jack of diamonds. East won with the king and led another diamond. West followed with the queen of clubs, which he had intended to overruff with the jack instead. He then ruffed his heart with the queen of spades.

Declarer by now had only trumps left, and being in dummy, led a club. East ruffed with the seven, hoping to promote a trump trick for his partner, and South overruffed with the nine.

Declarer was now in bad straits. He had the K-5-3 of spades left, while West had the 6-4-2 and East the singleton eight.

South could do no better than cash the king and lead another trump in the hope of finding a 2-2 split, but when he did this, West, who had been quietly minding his business, was able to win the last two tricks with the 6-4-2 and East the singleton eight.

It was now declarer's turn to cogitate. He had no convenient way of getting to his hand, but he drew trumps and cash eight tricks—he did not know how the trumps would break or whether the trump would drop—so, rightly or wrongly, he led the A-K-Q of clubs at this point, hoping the suit would be divided 3-2.

But East ruffed the third club with the ten, and South,
