Three Children Burned To Death In Quebec Home

PRINCEVILLE, Que. (CP) - Three children were burned to death Friday when fire swept through a farm home while their parents were working outside.
Another child escaped before flames levelled the 1 1/2 - storey house near this Eastern Township community.
The victims were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Armand LeCours—Celine, 3, Joanne, 2, and Pierre, seven months, Louise, 5, escaped.
The fire broke out about 7:30 a.m. EST, after Mr. LeCours had left for work and while Mrs. LeCours was working in a barn some distance from the house.
Another child, Denis, 6, was with her. Louise ran for her mother at the barn when the fire started but the woman was unable to reach the house in time to rescue the other children.
Firemen said they believe the blaze started with a short circuit. Only one body was recovered immediately and it could not be determined whether it was Celine or Joanne.
An inquest will be held at nearby Victoriaville.

Mr. Heath MacQuarrie, of Victoria, P.E.I., well known teacher, writer, and former Y. Man, was the guest speaker Thursday evening at the weekly supper meeting of the Alpha Y's Men's Club of Charlottetown.
Mr. MacQuarrie speaking on the subject, "The United Nations at the Crossroads" gave an enlightening and forceful talk tracing the efforts down the years from the Delian Confederation to the present United Nations, to form an organization to handle international disputes and so avoid armed conflict and the resulting bloodshed and misery.
"Over several decades," said Mr. MacQuarrie, "Canada has been actively interested in foreign affairs and in recent years has played a leading role, with its Secretary of State, filling an enlightening and important role of scientific diplomats like Herbert Norman, who recently met a tragic death in the world's present trouble spot.
