\$500 Fine, Six Months in Jail For Having Still

Two resident of Roseville pleaded guilty to possession of a still suitable for the manufacture of spirits contrary to section 158 of the Excise Act, before Magistrate R. S. Hinton at Alberton yesterday. Having previous convictions under the act, each was sentenced to a fine of \$50 and costs and six months in jail with an additional six months jail term in default of payment of the fines.

Combat Erosion By Seeding Manitoba Lands To Grass

WINNIPEG (CP) — Manitoba agriculture officials will seed to grass this year more than 6,000 acres of farm land susceptible to erosion from wind and water. Eventually, all of most of the 3,000,000 acres in the province that lose valuable topsoil each year will be protected by a grass cover.

Under the government program, the province pays one-third of the cost of the grass seed used. The amount remaining for the farmer to pay works out to about \$2 an acre.

Minimum acreage to be sown annually is 10 acres for each farmer with a maximum of 30 acres. But the seeding can be carried on for many years with a maximum of 30 acres until all of the farmer's vulnerable land is protected.

The 3,000,000 acres destined for seeding represents about one-quarter of the cultivated land in Manitoba. It is usually on slopes subject to water erosion or is light, sandy land affected by wind. It might be a combination of the two or land of low productivity because of alkali content.

Experts say that unless such land is stabilized about five years out of six it will be washed away. Four types of grass seed mixture are used in the program. For steep slopes where the land is fairly good, the seed mixture is bromes grass, meadow fescue and alfalfa. In sandy land subject to drought, and on eroded knolls, the department recommends bromes grass, crested wheat and alfalfa. In areas where water stays on the land for a long period in the spring, the best mixture contains canary grass, meadow fescue, timothy and alsike.

Alkaline land with low productivity takes a mixture of tall wheat grass, sweet clover and alsike.
