SAO PAULO, Brazil (CP)—The four Pan American Games came to a close Sunday with Canada winning a total of 63 medals in nine sports for its best showing ever in the quadrennial sports festival.

The last medals were won by team as disqualified for passing out of its lane after placing third.

The United States won the last seven gold medals in track and field and Mexico's Fidel Rosiland, B.C., the 800-metre champion who was the third-place bronze medalist in the metric mile.

A bad break cost Canada 400-metre relay track Saturday when the wet-lag race and field competition was a complete fiasco.

Canada hadn't won a gold medal in track and field. This time, the 17-member track and field team won 12 medals—five gold, five silver and two bronze—for its finest track and field performance by Canadians in post-war international competition.

The U.S. captured the big two of the track meet, the 1,500-metre and metric mile, when its two best milers, Jim Grelle and Jim Beatty, finished seventh.

Canadians competed only in Saturday's women's mile and 400-metre relay track Saturday when the wet-lag race and field competition was a complete fiasco.

# Richardson Hospitalized Following Title Defence

HALIFAX (CP)—Canadian Middleweight champion Blair Richardson was admitted to hospital early Sunday a few hours after retaining his title by a unanimous 12-round decision over rough Willie Greaves.

The 22-year-old divinity student from South Bay, Cape Breton, was badly battered by Greaves in the last stages of the gruelling fight.

Richardson was admitted to Victoria General Hospital for X-rays. A hospital official said Sunday night "Blair is perfectly well... he's getting masses of visitors. He recovered very nicely."

X-rays showed no head injuries, the spokesman said. Richardson was kept in hospital a further day for rest.

Richardson, bleeding a nose, was pounded by the ex-champion in the 12th round as Greaves attempted to score a knockout. Richardson was tangled in the ropes at the end and Greaves' handlers got him back in the ring just after the bell sounded. He appeared dazed for several minutes.

Richardson was in command through much of the early fighting and in the eighth had Greaves in difficulty. But the challenger, wobbly and glassy-eyed, moved into a clinch in the ninth and 10th Greaves' punches still seemed powerful while Richardson's lacked their earlier steam.

Will Williams of New Waterford, N.S., and Boston handed Les Sprague, Canadian junior welterweight champion, a beating in the six-round semi-final, a nose title affair. Williams, lightning fast but a light puncher, won a unanimous decision. Sprague was hurting Williams in the last round.

It was the third meeting between the two men of completely opposite boxing styles and the first to go the limit.

Greaves, an Edmonton native who revels in the light-fighting and never stops swinging, won the first at Glouce Bay, N.S., last July with a 10th-round technical knockout to hold on to his title.

## N.S. Bowlers Cop Tourney For Blind

MONCTON (CP)—A five-man team representing the Charlottetown Club of the blind, New Glasgow, N.S., Saturday won the Fraser trophy here by defeating five other Maritime teams in the fourth annual inter-club bowling tournament for blind bowlers.

The New Glasgow squad of Robert Howard, H. Brodeur, Harold White, Carl Rodgers and Ian McDonald bowled 5,357 in eight strings of candlepins to take the Maritime championship from the Fundy Club of Saint John, N.B., by 47 points.

The Fundy club had won the three previous meets.

High individual average for a totally blind bowler went to Harold White of the MacLeod club. He posted an 81.3 for the day.

White also took top honors in his class for singles with a 99.

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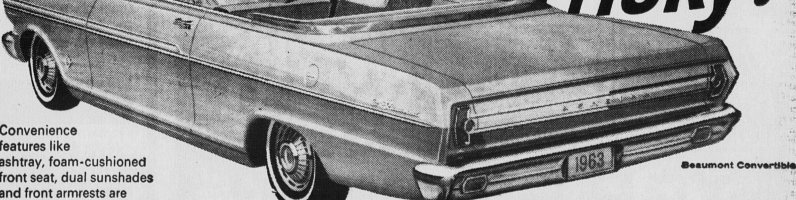
