THE ELLIOTT AT SAVANNAH, GA.

Captain Brown Brings Latest News About the Mosquito Coast Disturbances. The steamer Elliott, Captain Angus Brown, arrived at Tybee Saturday night, from Bluefields, Nicaragua. After leaving quarantine, Sunday morning, a New York Herald correspondent was received on board and given the first detailed news of the disturbances on the Mosquito Coast. Captain Brown is thus reported: "The steamer Elliott arrived at Bluefields on February 27 and at once began unloading her cargo. She was watched with great interest by the natives, as she was thought to be a man-of-war, but all fears were allayed when the steamer began taking in a cargo of fruit."

Captain Brown says the Comae, British man-of-war, arrived at Bluefields February 27 and left about fifty men and two gatlugs on an old American hulk lying in the harbor. The Comae then proceeded to Aspinwall to cable for instructions, and returned to Bluefields on the 1st. Meantime the men left on the hulk went ashore and found the Nicaraguans in full charge of the public buildings. The men from the Comae compelled them to hoist the Mosquito flag alongside of that of Nicaragua. Captain Brown is positive that the British flag was not hoisted up to the time of his sailing from Bluefields, Sunday, March 4, although the impression of the Mosquitoes seems to be that England will make an attempt in the near future to take possession of the country. Business was being conducted without interruption.

Latest advices from Bluefields to the State Department at Washington say that the British marines have retired from the Mosquito territory and are now on board the Cleopatra. It is expected that the United States will demand an explanation from the British government on the ground that the action of the British naval officer in landing marines was an encroachment on the Monroe doctrine and a violation of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty. Captain Brown should feel pleased that he not only escaped delay at Bluefields, but also that he has removed all uneasiness that existed in the minds of the Washington authorities and "tail-twisters" to the south of us, arising from the report that the British flag had been raised on the Mosquito coast and so-called American rights invaded.

It is gratifying to know that the new Charlottetown steamer has proved a success from the start, and THE EXAMINER extends its congratulations to Captain McMillan, her commanding officer. The Elliott sailed from Savannah for Bluefields on Monday, the 12th inst.

[This territory (the Mosquito) which stretches along the coast from 10° 30' to 13° N. lat., and for about forty miles inland, had enjoyed a semi-independent position under the nominal protection of Great Britain from 1655 to 1850. By the Clayton-Bulwer treaty of 1850 England resigned all claims to the Mosquito coast, and by the treaty of Nicaragua in 1858 ceded the protectorate absolutely to Nicaragua. The local chief died in 1864, and Nicaragua has never recognized his successor. Nevertheless, the reserve continues to be ruled by a chief elected by the natives and assisted by an administrative council, which assembles at Bluefields, the capital of the territory.—Encyc. Brit.]
