MORE ISLAND HORSES.—Says the St. John Telegraph: On Tuesday Mr. J. W. Smith received ten P. E. Island horses at his stable, Germain Street. Yesterday morning eight of this lot, together with two other horses received from the Island some time ago, were shipped on board the I. S. S. Co's. steamer for Eastport and Boston. Mr. W. S. McKie is expected to be in the city in a few days with another lot of P. E. Island horses.

SCORCHED AGAIN.—The most destructive fire that has visited Jacksonville, Fla., for many years broke out at 2 o'clock on Wednesday morning. A high wind prevailing, the fire spread rapidly northward till it consumed everything combustible in the area of blocks bounded by Haw and West Adams streets on the north, Clay on the east, and the creek on the south. The buildings were mostly wooden, and of an inferior character, but many business firms were located among them. At least 60 buildings are destroyed, the majority the homes of colored people. The loss will probably reach \$200,000; insurance light.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. THE JOHNSTOWN DISASTER. Very Latest Particulars.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 6. A wall has been thrown around Johnstown, and nobody can enter unless it is shown that he has business. Dr. Gross, of the health board, says there will be 1,000 men at work here to-morrow morning. The sanitary question is paramount this afternoon. The work of the board was distributed, Dr. Lee taking a relay to Pittsburgh, where a force of sanitary inspectors will be established, half to go up the river by boat, the remainder to take a construction crew up the railway. The latter has adopted cremation as its cry, and to-morrow night the desolate valley valley will be lit up with bonfires, of wreckage, which will be the pyre of hundreds of dead bodies. Superintendent Fling estimates that it will take 10,000 men sixty days to clear away the wreck. At this rate it will require \$150,000 to pay for the work and that does not include other expenses. Five million dollars will not be enough to put Johnstown in shape for rebuilding.

Chief Justice Gray Dead. VICTORIA, B. C., June 6. Hon. John Hamilton Gray, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, died last evening from paralysis, in the seventy-fifth year of his age.

OTTAWA, June 6. The death of that distinguished New Brunswick, Judge Gray, of Victoria, B. C., is keenly felt by old politicians here, among whom he was greatly respected. He had during the past few years made a special study of the Alaska-Canadian boundary question, of which he undoubtedly possessed a greater knowledge than any person who survives him.

The Seal Fisheries. OTTAWA, June 6. A private letter received in this city from a gentleman in Vancouver, who is personally interested in seal fishing matters, states there is a strong feeling here that this year will see the end of the trouble or the beginning of more serious complications; that the United States will persist in their absurd claims seems incredible, and is not seriously believed by their own people. On this coast last year our vessels had a walk over, and realized a splendid profit; this year they will boldly enter the sea and claim the rights of British seamen's ships on the ocean everywhere else common to nations.

Dr. McGlynn in Ottawa. OTTAWA, June 6. Dr. McGlynn, of New York, lectured here to-night on his anti-poverty policy. He has a splendid physique and strikingly intelligent appearance, and speaks both fluently and earnestly. In an interview, he declared himself still a Catholic, and said he intends to devote the rest of his life to the cause of the poor.

Through Mails. OTTAWA, June 6. The Postmaster-General, in an interview to-day, stated that he had already given instructions that through mails to and from the Maritime Provinces should be forwarded by the Short Line Railway from Montreal to St. John.

Big Fire at Seattle. CHICAGO, June 6. A despatch received this evening says Seattle, W. T., is burning. Loss five millions. It is reported that the remainder of the city is in danger.

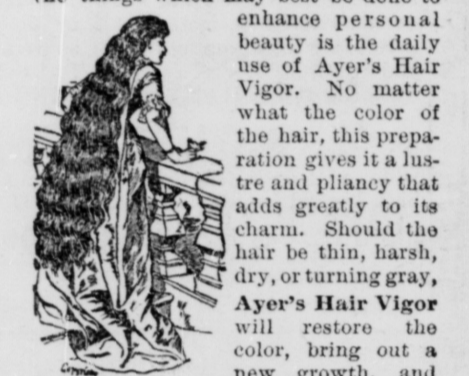

Summer Communications. SIR,—I was much pleased to see the sensible article in the Patriot, on the 5th inst., on the above question, supplementary to your article of the 3rd. But your article of last evening rather surprised me on account of your charity in the matter. The people of this Island have had enough waiting for late trains and mails in the past without very much grumbling; and when it was announced that we were still to be supplied with our Steam Navigation Co., their many friends were glad of the fact. But our mails, coming in late as they have for three nights this week, will exhaust our patience. Many persons are asking the question, "Why could we have our mails in so early last week and so late this?"—is one steamer so much slower than the other? If so, why not give the mails and passengers the benefit of the fast one, or, if too much freight is the trouble, why not charter a small steamer to assist while we are waiting for the new one? We are entitled to our mails on advertised time, and the parties contracting for their conveyance should have them here at that time. It would be a great saving in time and expense for travellers to and from our great Western country, as well as quicker despatch for mails, if we had connection with the C. P. R. fast express train; but with our present steamers, I fear it is out of the question. Our mails would require to be at Paines about 11.30 a.m., and in order to do that we would require a boat capable of speeding more like the Stanley. Then it would be quite possible; and I hope for the benefit of all concerned that you, with all other papers, will advocate for nothing short of such a boat. Yours, &c., PROGRESS.
