

## Leafs Shatter Red Wing's Record; Rocket Richard Still Scoreless

DETROIT, Nov. 2 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs crumpled up Detroit Red Wings' string of 18 unbeaten home games tonight with a 4-2 National Hockey League win before 14,162 fans.

The win moved the Leafs into second place.

The defeat, first since Jan. 26 last for the Wings here at Olympia Stadium, was doubly humiliating—the Wings haven't managed to beat the Leafs this season in three tries.

Toronto's Sid Smith, Jim Morrison, Max Bentley and Harry Watson riddled the puck past goalie Terry Sawchuk, who halted 31 other shots.

Gordie Howe scored in the first period for Detroit during a scramble and Marty Pavelich tallied the Wings' other goal late in the final period during another scramble.

**MONTREAL 2, NEW YORK 2**

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (AP)—Montreal's Maurice (Rocket) Richard failed again tonight to shatter the National Hockey League's all-time goal-scoring record as the Canadiens battled New York Rangers to a 2-2 tie.

Richard, who tied Nels (Old Poison) Stewart's record of 374 goals last Wednesday at Toronto, now has missed in two attempts to get the goal that would break that mark.

He was held scoreless when Montreal beat the Rangers 4-1 Saturday night in Montreal. And tonight, though he came close on several occasions, New York's rookie goalie, Lorne Worsley, blanked him again. The Rocket wasn't held pointless tonight, however.

He was credited with an assist

on Montreal's second goal, a third-period tally by Bert Olmstead. Defenseman Doug Harvey also assisted on the play.

While the Rangers were checking Richard hard and close, his two linemates, Elmer Lach and Olmstead, took care of the scoring.

## 3 Mt. A. Soccer Players In Hospital After Crash

FREDERICTON, Nov. 2 (CP)—Three soccer players from Mount Allison University at Sackville, N. B., were admitted to hospital here today after a chartered bus swerved off the road at Jamseg and plunged down a 40-foot embankment.

Eleven other players escaped with bruises and were able to return to Sackville tonight.

Those in hospital were Tom Buffett, Grand Banks, Nfld., broken ankle; Carl Hansen, Corner Brook, Nfld., broken leg; Keith Blake, West Indies, broken shoulder.

The bruised and shaken up students, were Gilbert Wells, Gander, Nfld.; John Bursley, Grand Banks, Nfld.; Roy Weisman, Badger, Nfld.; Bill Manuel, West Indies; Norman Lush, Gander; Alex Coles, Nunan's Cove, Nfld.; Stan Ratteray, West Indies; Edison Skinner, Louisburg, N. S.; Morris Terceira, Bermuda; Cuthbert Sebastian, West Indies, and Jim Myrden, Corner Brook.

The players returning from a Saturday game were sleeping when the accident occurred from undetermined cause at 6:45 a. m. Police said the weather was foggy and visibility practically zero.

The bus was chartered from the Sunny Brae Bus Lines, Ltd., Moncton.

Dr. D. W. McLaughlin, dean of men at Mount Allison, came to Fredericton to make arrangements for the students' return to Sackville.

It also could be that 28 points by one team in a single game constitutes a new scoring record in regular intercollegiate play. It is certainly the biggest score that we can remember in such competition. The Saints, however, owed such a trimming to the Axemen for quite a number of years. In three other starts against the Axemen in the past quarter of a century the local Collegians were unable to score a point.

But they have more than made up for lost time this year. In five intercollegiate games to date the Saints have scored 58 points while taking only seven scored against them. They have scored 16 tries, three converts and two penalty kicks for their point tally. The points against them have resulted from one try and two penalty kicks. Oddly enough the try against them was scored by Acadia when the Saints suffered their only defeat of the season. After Saturday's game that try by Acadia will go down as the eighth wonder of the world.

The Saints probably played a shade better in crushing Acadia 28-2 Saturday than they did the night before when they defeated St. F. X. In both games they played outstanding ball, but the game against the Xaverians still ranks in our mind as the one which produced the better all-around ball. Saturday the weather was perfect for football. Had the weather been as perfect on other days the Saints might have run up higher scores.

Despite the impressive triumphs which the Saints have behind them they still have a tough task before they can win the Maritime Intercollegiate football championship. While the Saints have been knocking over the opponents in swashbuckling fashion, a group of Mount Allison University footballers have been eking out victories in the same league. The result is that the Saints and Mounties are tied for first place and they meet one another in the deciding game in Sackville on Saturday. Mounties have always been hard to beat and the Saints will go into this coming battle knowing full well that they will have to fight every inch of the way in order to win.

But there's no taking away from the Saints their list of accomplishments this season. They are certainly one of the best if not the best football team ever produced here. Every time they go onto the field they come out with 13 stars and have three more sitting on the sidelines as capable as those on the field. That they have been well coached by A. J. McAdam goes without saying. Each time they appear on the field they look a little better. It is to be hoped that the progression continues for at least another week.

A consideration of the game would not be complete without a word about Bunny Forde, the great little negro backfielder for Acadia. Bunny, beyond a doubt, was the outstanding man on the visitors' team. He took part in nearly every play for the Axemen whether it was on the offense or defense. He gave a great exhibition of sportsmanship as well and his example could well be imitated by two of his fellow team-mates.

Three Island boys played with the Axemen and they were Ronnie Nicholson, Jim MacNeill and Joey Hoy. Nicholson, a hard running backfielder, stood out in the Axemen's cause. MacNeill and Hoy, who are forwards, turned in good games.

## Mt. A. Keeps Hopes Alive With 10-9 Win Over St. F. X.

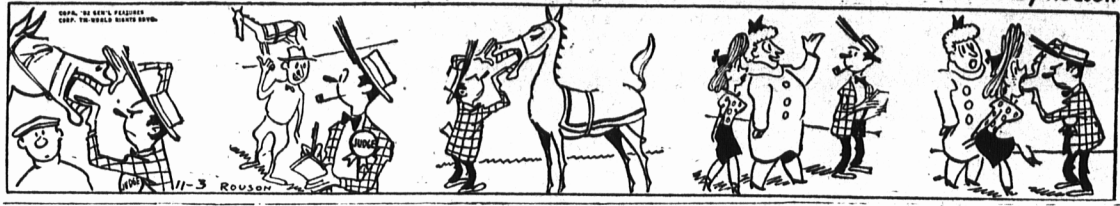
ANTIGONISH, N. S., Nov. 2 (CP)—Mount Allison University kept their Maritime intercollegiate rugby hopes alive Saturday as they edged winless St. Francis Xavier Varsity 10-9 in a regular collegiate contest.

The Mounties played a driving, hard-tackling game to take the victory but were forced to the limit by the underdog Xaverians.

The visitors led 7-2 going into the second half. Fleet-footed Bob Tendon, a winger from Truro, counted the first try for Mount Allison and two penalty kicks by Les Davies upped the margin to 7-0. A penalty kick by Packer MacFarland ended the first half scoring.

Don Allen scored on an unconverted try in the second and St. F. X. scored its first try of the season on a completed line run by Cliff Maxwell. Two penalty kicks by MacFarland ended the scoring.

## Sid Abel Good As Stimulant To Black Hawks

CHICAGO, Nov. 2 (AP)—How able is Sid Abel? Newest coach in the National Hockey League, personable old bootnose has proved more stimulating to Chicago Black Hawks than a gallon of benzadrine.

The man who captained Detroit Red Wings to four straight National Hockey League titles as pivot on the production line with Gordie Howe and Ted Lindsay, Abel has produced a minor miracle by lifting the hopeless Hawks of a year ago into strong contention.

How does he do it? Simple, he hustles for him. Second, he believes the deal with Toronto which put Al Rollins in goal, Gus Mortson on defence and Cal Gardner as centre on the No. 1 line has helped balance the team.

And third, somebody had to apply a monkey wrench to the Hawks' porous defence.

"I had to tighten 'em up," he said. "That was obviously their worst failing in past seasons. They scored enough. But they weren't keeping the other guys from scoring. They played as individuals. Now they're a team."

And, as an afterthought: "Please don't go overboard on us. We're not a first-place team. I'll be satisfied if we make the playoffs."

The Hawks haven't been in the post-season games since 1945-46; finished last five of the last six years. They've since been coached by Johnny Gottselig, Chuck Conacher, Red Hamill and Ebbie Goodfellow.

Abel, signed as a player-coach, has taken only one turn on the ice since the season started.

Rollins, in goal, has been "terrific," according to Abel. This was expected to be a team weakness in some quarters, but the tall, thin netminder has made fans forget Harry Lumley, traded to Toronto.

## Jinx Holds As Atlantics Bow To Glace Bay 4-1

## Most Impressive Win For Saints In Maritime Intercollegiate Football

The Saint Dunstan's University football team, using English rugby and American football plays and rolling up an American football score, walloped Acadia University 28-2 here Saturday afternoon in one of the greatest scoring displays ever witnessed on a local football field.

The steamrolling Saints, who keep improving on each trip to the field, struck for three tries with lightning-like thrusts in the first nine minutes of the game as they ripped through or sped around the Acadia Axemen's defenses.

Before the afternoon was spent the A. J. MacAdam-coached Saints had scored eight tries, one convert and a penalty kick as they ran, passed and tackled the Axemen into a blob of submission.

Despite their one-sided win, however, the Saints are still tied with Mount Allison University of Sackville for first place in the Maritime Intercollegiate League. The Mounties kept pace with the Saints on Saturday squeaking out a 10-9 win over St. F. X. The Saints and Mounties meet next Saturday at Sackville in the final game of the league.

The Saints' scoring parade reads something like a hockey summary. Phil Coyle, Lloyd Gaudet and Paul Jay each scored two tries while Cop Callaghan and Clarence MacDonald struck for one apiece. Pete Dunphy made good on one convert and Jack Reardon scored the other two points on a penalty kick.

The lone Acadia score came on a penalty kick from the 30-yard line in the first half. Wentzell, tall Acadia wingman tid the booting.

The win was certainly the most impressive ever registered by St. Dunstan's in intercollegiate play. It marked the first time that the Saints have ever defeated Acadia and the first time they have ever crossed the Axemen's line.

The Saints took less than three minutes to wipe out this latter record Saturday. Lloyd Gaudet on a brilliant 20 yard run sped around the Acadians to score in the left hand corner at the 258 mark. Gaudet was set up beautifully by Clarence MacDonald, who finished the best football game of his career.

This was only the first of seven more such events to occur during the next 70 minutes. For the most part the Saints kept the play in the Axemen's end of the field and at the end of the first ten minutes they were in the lead by 22-0. As they were in the first ten. As it turned out their final try was scored just before the final whistle.

Acadia kicked off to open the game and there followed a long exchange of kicks before Pete Dunphy ran the ball well into Acadia territory. It was from a scrum shortly afterward that Clarence MacDonald set Gaudet up for his first try.

Fans had hardly completed their applause of the first try when Phil "Scouts" Coyle streaked through for another to make the score 10-0. "Scouts" scored on a play started by big Art Pendergast on the Acadia 40 yard line. Pendergast advanced the ball to the 20 yard mark before passing to Allan MacDonald who relayed the ball to Coyle.

The fans were just recovering from the effects of Coyle's try when Paul Jay raced 40 yards to score another three points. Jay's run was the most brilliant of the afternoon as he outdistanced four men to cross the Acadia line and place the ball behind the posts.

Pistol Pete Dunphy started the play with a short kick from behind the scrum. Clarence MacDonald followed up fast, grabbed the ball and managed to get a pass to Phil Coyle. Coyle threw a long pass to Jay who took the ball on the dead run.

At this point the Acadians got themselves untracked. Led by Bunny Ford, their outstanding player and one of the best men on the field they penetrated deep into S. D. U. territory. The Saints relieved the pressure by kicking but Ronnie Nicholson and Wentzell ran the ball back near the Saints' line.

Finally on the 30 yard line the Saints were penalized for a rule infraction and Wentzell split the upright to make the score 9-2.

Three minutes afterwards the Saints got back those two points when fullback Jack Reardon made good on a 40 yard penalty kick.

Play remained about even for the next 12 minutes. Then with a little over four minutes left in the half Clarence MacDonald streaked through to score another try for the Saints.

The score resulted from a good half line run following a scrum on the Acadia 25. The Saints heeled the ball and pinking quarter Pete Dunphy sent Allan MacDonald away on the run. Allan passed to Clarence MacDonald and the latter cut through a mass of players to score between the posts. MacDonald's try made the score 14-2.

It was the Saints' turn to kick-off in the second half and from the time of first kick to the last whistle the ball rarely left the Axemen's territory.

Big Cop Callaghan, standout forward for the Saints, put his name in the record books about the ten-minute mark of the half when he raced 20 yards to place the ball between the uprights and make the score 17-2. Pete Dunphy converted the try for the extra two points.

Acadia had no sooner kicked off than the Saints were back hammering at their line. For minutes on end they kept the Axemen on their five yard line with a determined attack. They finally broke through with a smart hand-off play.

Following a scrum on the Axemen's five yard line Pete Dunphy got the ball. Allan MacDonald started the half line away with a fake pass from Dunphy. Phil Coyle coming behind MacDonald took the ball and raced through for his second try of the afternoon. The score at this point of the game was 22-2.

But the try only relieved one St. Dunstan's attack and set the stage for another. This time Art Pendergast started the wheels rolling as he grabbed a loose ball and sent Allan MacDonald away on the run. Allan passed to Clarence MacDonald and the shifty inside half put Gaudet in the clear again to score in the left hand corner and run the count to 25-2.

There was only five minutes left in the game and fans were pulling for the Saints to run the score to 30. They almost did but time ran out on them.

With less than a minute left to go the Saints heeled the ball from a scrum on the Acadia 25. Jack Reardon heaved a 40-yard pass to
