Raschi Pitches Cards To Nat. League First Place

Vic Raschi, the one-time Yankee, pitched the St. Louis Cardinals into the National League lead Wednesday as he shut out the New York Giants, 3-0, for his fifth straight triumph.

The veteran righthander was seldom sharper as he set down the Giants with five hits and didn't walk a man. It was his first shut-out as a National Leaguer.

Meanwhile, the Chicago Cubs scored nine runs on three hits and three errors in a woolly eighth inning to beat Brooklyn, 9-3, and knock the Dodgers out of a tie for first place.

The Cardinals' victory put St. Louis a half-game ahead of the Philadelphia Phillies, who played host to Milwaukee Wednesday night. Cincinnati was at Pittsburgh in the National and Washington played at Baltimore in the American in other night games.

INDIANS HOLD LEAD

The Cleveland Indians held their lead in the American League by downing the Boston Red Sox, 3-3, on two unearned runs for their seventh consecutive victory. It's the longest winning streak of the young season.

In other American League games the New York Yankees made a two-game sweep of the Chicago White Sox series, winning 3-2, and the Detroit Tigers topped the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-3.

At Brooklyn, Carl Erskine, the world series strikeout king, had pitched 17 straight scoreless innings until the roof fell in the eighth. He walked the first two men to face him and then Dee Fondy smacked a home run over the rightfield screen.

That started the fireworks which flared into nine runs, four walks and three errors. Erskine suffered his first defeat after four straight victories. Bob Rush was the winner, although relieved in the eighth for a pinch-hitter. Billy Cox hit a seventh-inning homer for the Dodgers with none on.

MAGLIE HARD HIT

Sal Maglie was the Giants' victim at the Polo Grounds. He gave up eight hits, including home runs by Red Schoendienst and Rip Repulse.

Bob Lemon registered his sixth pitching victory for Cleveland, allowing only four hits. The Indian cause was aided by Al Rosen's sixth homer in five games and two costly errors by Boston's Milt Bolling which gave up two unearned runs in the eighth.

Bob Grim, who replaced Ed Lopat in the eighth, received credit for the Yankees' victory over the White Sox. Billy Pierce, who went all the way, was Chicago's loser.

Al Kaline's single with the bases loaded gave the Tigers their ninth-inning victory over the Athletics. Dick Marlowe, who pitched only the ninth inning, was the winner.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Dick Hall's timely two-run single in the fifth and Max Surkont's steady right-hit pitching carried Pittsburgh Pirates to a 3-2 victory over Cincinnati Redlegs in the National League Wednesday night.

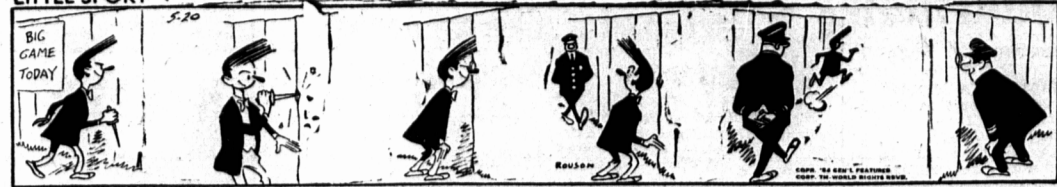

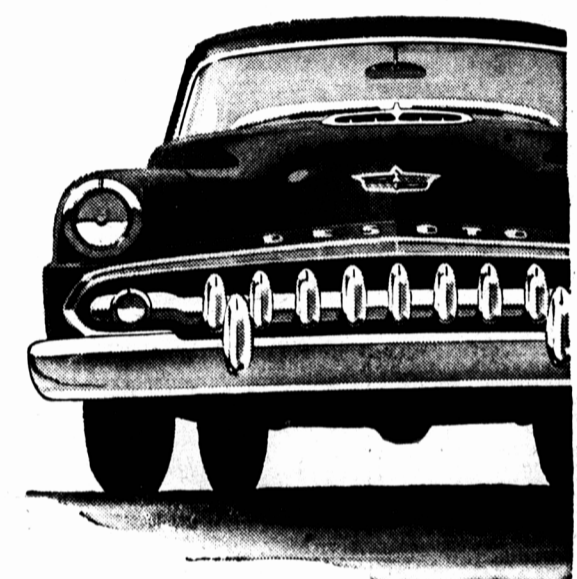
