Lady Injured In Accident

*Mrs. P. J. McKenna, Montague, is a patient in the King's County Hospital as the result of a hit-and-run accident which occurred about 5 p.m. yesterday near Gauley's Brook on the Commercial Road about 1-2 mile from Montague.

A gravel truck rounding the turn at this point sideswiped on the right front fender the light coupe, driven by Mr. McKenna, after it had come off the Kilmuir Road. The car was shoved off the pavement, over the embankment into the deep ditch. Mrs. McKenna was seriously hurt about the chest and is presently under observation in the hospital. Mr. McKenna received cuts about the head and other abrasions. The car was considerably damaged on the front where it plowed into the bank.

The driver of the gravel truck did not remain on the scene of the accident, but the Montague detachment R.C.M.P. are investigating and expect to apprehend the driver shortly.

Maritime Inter-group A.A.'s Hold Anniversary Gathering

"I have great sympathy for the man who is an alcoholic and am glad to see in practice the philosophy of the Good Samaritan whereby in helping others you help yourselves," said His Excellency the Right Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown, in addressing the members of the Maritime Inter-group Association of Alcoholics Anonymous at their 31st annual banquet held in the Community Centre Saturday night. His Excellency expressed hope that the work of the organization would flourish "to the good of yourselves and the glory of God."

Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, in speaking on behalf of the Premier and the Government of the Province, said it was "an honour, a privilege, a pleasure and a revelation" to be in attendance. "May you have continued success in reclaiming those not able to fight the battle alone, realizing as you do that without God, man can do nothing."

Lieut. Col. J. D. Stewart, D.S.O., Mayor of the city, said he was indeed glad and happy to be here at this wonderful gathering to extend a cordial welcome to the visitors on behalf of the City of Charlottetown. "We at city hall are well aware of the wonderful work done by the local group of A. A. and I take this opportunity to commend them for their worthwhile achievements."

A letter was read from Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse regretting his inability to be present.

A member of the Amherst group said that in A. A. he had discovered a new way of life in which his drinking problem had been solved. "Many alcoholics shear away from the 'Higher Power' approach to their problem," he said, "but I assure you that the acceptance of help from the Deity must be without reservation."

In speaking of his experience,

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a member of the Cornerbrook, Nfld. group said he was a duly qualified member of the A.A., having been in hospitals, including mental institutions on several occasions through the devastations of alcohol.

"Alcoholism is a three-fold illness," said a speaker member of the Halifax group, "Mental, physical and spiritual; and until I took the first step in humility and turned to a Higher Power my attitude was without reservation."
