Glace Bay Wins 3-2 McCurdy Cup Semi-Final From Ch'town Abbies

GLACE BAY N.S. Nov. 12 (CP)—The Glace Bay Caledonia No. 11 football team scored a close 3-2 victory over the Charlottetown Abegweits in a rugged contest here Saturday in a sudden death semi-final McCurdy Cup playoff competition.

Tom "Mugs" Appleton's second half touchdown gave the Caledonian's edge on points over Art Perry's two-point penalty kick effort at the fifteen minute mark of the opening half.

But it wasn't a verdict that agreed with the views of Abegweit team officials who complained that the game had been called when 12 minutes of official playing time in the second half remained unplayed.

Mr. A. J. McAdam of Saint Dunstan's University who on the request of referee Mel Sheppard of Glace Bay, acted as unofficial timekeeper for the match, recorded twelve minutes of playing time according to a stop watch when referee Sheppard blew the whistle to end the game.

Coaches Gordon Bennett and Lt. Col. W. J. MacDonald of the Abegweit club, although extremely vexed over the apparent lack of proper supervision of the match, declined to make any official protest to McCurdy Cup officials.

Mr. Roy MacDonald, official appointed to referee the match was presiding at a game elsewhere and referee Sheppard was appointed to take his place by the Caledonian Club.

Forcing the play right from the opening whistle, the Abbies kept the play deep into Caledonian territory with their pressing attack kept the opposition continually in trouble and came within an ace of scoring in the early part of the first half.

Confronting the said referee with these "minor details" he accorded the Abbies the full extent of his courtesy by striding from the field in a highly unconcerned manner, that to say the least, left them in a thoroughly disgusted attitude with the whole situation. So much so in fact, that they didn't even deem it worthy to tender an official protest to McCurdy Cup officials.

What was the big issue? It was the calling of the game by the official referee when the Abbie team and management had every right to believe that there was still 12 minutes of playing time left in the final half. At least that was the time left to be played as recorded by A. J. McAdam's stop watch at the time the game was called. Mr. McAdam, as an unbiased spectator who accompanied the Abbie team on the trip, had been asked by the presiding referee to act as unofficial timer. There was no debating the end of the first half time when Abbies lead the period by a 2-0 score, but was a different story in the final half.

Taking the advantage in the play for the first time in the game early in the final half, the Glace Bay team went over for a try to make the score read 3-2 in their favor. In the opinion of the two Abegweit coaches, Lt.-Col. W. J. MacDonald and Gordon Bennett, the score was made on "a play that resulted in three offside passes before it was completed."

However, that was apparently not the opinion of the referee, as no whistle was blown to indicate it as such. And in view of this fact, the said coaches were content to let it go at that. But later in that same half when Abbies again started to show superiority in the territory play and were in a position from where they threatened to score, it was more than they could take when the game was called 12 min-
