

# Dodgers Plan Braves; Twins Blast Bengals

Don Drysdale fired a neat five-hitter for his 22nd victory... and Maury Wills dashed for his 94th stolen base as Los Angeles Dodgers...  
The triumph enabled the pennant-faded Dodgers to move four full games ahead of second-place San Francisco...  
Wills, a 135-pound speedster, opened the game second and promptly stole the second in his bid to break Ty Cobb's major league record of 86 thefts in 1915. Wills has 94 in 153 games. Cobb didn't get his 83rd and 84th until the 154th game, and then—because his team had played in two ties earlier in the campaign—had chances to steal in each of the next two outings.

The Dodgers picked up a run in the first as Wills singled to left, stole second, moved to third on a safe hunt by Jim Gilliam and scored as Tommy Seaver grounded into a double play.  
Milwaukee starter Bob Hendley's wildness was the cause of Wills' single to centre. Gilliam walked to fill the bases and David Lewis led a two-run single to left.

Jack Curtis finished up for the Braves, serving up a homer to Frank Howard in the ninth. A two-night doubleheader scheduled at New York, between the Mets and Houston, was postponed by rain. The games will be played Thursday. The suspended game of Sept. 9 between the two has been cancelled.

# Aussies Gain Confidence As Gretel Made Ready

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP)—Fresh confidence was evident in the Australian camp Wednesday as Gretel, the gallant yachting challenger, was made ready for her third race against Westery in the battle for the America's Cup.

"I've said all along we're going to take back the cup, and now I know it," said little Archie Robertson, the 32-year-old deputy skipper of the trim Aussie sloop.

Alan Payne, the designer, said he believed certain flaws had been corrected and that Gretel now is ready to give her finest performance. Jock Sturrock, the helmsman, was pleased with his crew's "muscle."

"I think our boys are physically stronger," said Sturrock, the rugged 46-year-old Melbourne lumber dealer who outfitted the famed Emil Bus Mosbacher in Tuesday's second race to tie up the best-of-seven series at one race each.

"Weatherly's boys are equally well-drilled, but I think we're stronger," he added, commenting on his boat's success in a tacking duel with Weatherly on the night of the first race.

"They're always fiddling with her, like some bloke with a hot rod," commented one Australian observer.  
"Payne said Gretel's disappointing performance in the opening race was due to the selection of the wrong mainsail and that this was a mistake which would not be repeated.

"It was the sails which caused her to heel," he said. "She sailed stiffer yesterday. We think she'll be better tomorrow."  
While the Australians slowly recovered from an evening of unrestrained celebration, the Americans turned more grimly to the job at hand. Until jarred by Tuesday's setback—the first
