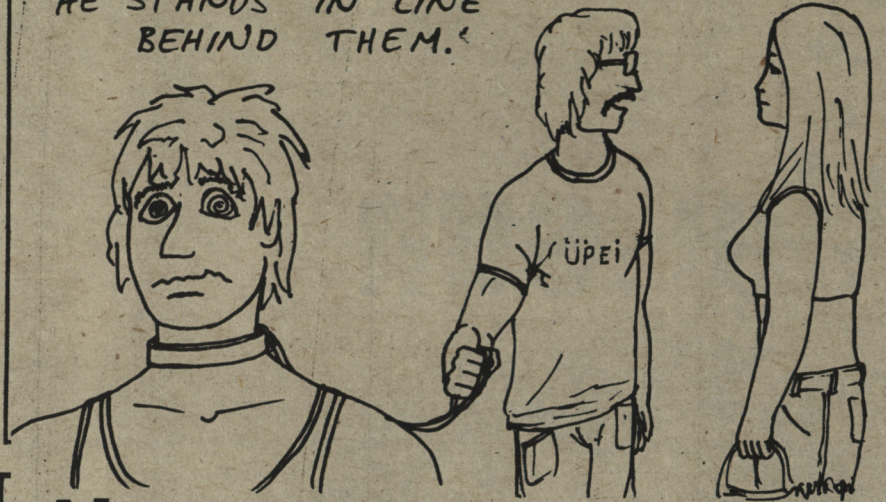
As was reported in last week's issue, the name change was brought about by the reputation for "smut and trash" The Cadre, the former paper had obtained.
