Steel Plan Betrayal Suspected By British Labor Leftwingers

LONDON (CP)—The left wing of Britain's ruling Labor party apparently suspects betrayal in the great steel debate, amid spreading rumors that the government may finally settle for something less than full control of the country's basic steel industry.

Three left-wing Labor MPs have called for clarification of the government's intentions following disclosure Economics Minister George Brown had been secretly negotiating with two party "rebels" for two days to obtain their parliamentary support Thursday in return for a promise to consider possible nationalization plans.

The parliamentary vote, the first stage in what is likely to be a long summer battle, was on the government's white paper setting out plans for nationalization of the country's 14 major steel producers, turning out 50 per cent of British steel.

The government won the vote 316 to 265.

Prime Minister Wilson earlier had assured his party he would settle for nothing less than 100 per cent control.

VOTED WITH GOVT
Two Labor moderates, Desmond Donnelly and Woodrow Wyatt, said they could not support such a move but in a sudden and surprising shift, voted with the government on the white paper after Brown's statement.

Friday, Brown's office reiterated that the government is "prepared to listen" to any steel industry proposals providing for less than 100 per cent government control.

And F. T. Judge, president of the British Iron and Steel Federation, said if there is any real

change in the government's position, "the industry would of course be interested in discussions."

The government originally planned to take control by forcing all company shares. Rumors the government now may settle for something less than full control knocked millions of dollars off steel share prices on the London stock market. Some investors had calculated they would have made a profit if they sold all their holdings to the government at 1964 prices.

Three Commons left-wingers, Tom Driberg, Michael Foot and Ian Mikardo, immediately demanded a Labor party meeting to clarify the party's policy, suggesting there are differences in statements issued by Wilson and Brown.

This brought evening newspaper headlines Friday that Wilson faces a revolt from the left with predictions the steel industry will not be fully controlled by the government before the next general election.

Wyatt said he was approached by the government last Tuesday, two days before the debate, with a mysterious telephone call from "a Mr. Clark" who turned out to be Brown. Donnelly was brought into the talks later, Wyatt added.

Translation Of Place Names Is Worry For Trade Board

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—What happens when the names of places like Balm of Gilead or Left Hand Grindstone Brook in New Brunswick are translated into French?

Or places like Jerry's Nose, Come-By-Chance, Tickle Beach, Blow-Me-Down and Turnip Cove in Newfoundland?

The Saint John Board of Trade is afraid such names would lose in the translation, if they could be translated at all and still mean the same thing.

At a meeting, the board was told the province of Quebec's 1964 official road map has translated into French names of places in the Atlantic Provinces.

The board formed a resolution for submission to the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade annual meeting which in effect would point out to the Quebec government the problem in trying to translate some of the place names.

Board president Harry Hallworth said it would be important to present the resolution lightly, yet with an "undercurrent of seriousness" to make the point.

"I don't think you'd want this as a desk-thumping resolution," he said. "It should be presented in a humorous vein—but there is an underlying purpose."

The preamble to the resolution, to be submitted at the MPBT's annual meeting here June 8-9, says the Quebec road map "takes certain liberties" with names of places in the Atlantic Provinces.

Steel Trawler Is Launched At Pictou Yard

PICTOU, N.S. (CP)—The 120-foot steel trawler Burwolf was christened here Saturday for Burgeo Trawlers Ltd. and Burgeo Fish Industries Ltd. of Burgeo, Nfld.

Seven-year-old Sarah Marie Lake, daughter of Spencer Lake, representative of the owners, performed the christening honors at Ferguson Industrial Ltd. shipyard.

Earlier in the day, four-year-old George Lake, brother of Sarah Marie, launched the Burwolf, a sister ship expected to be completed for the Newfoundland company in September.

The Burwolf sailed Sunday for the fishing banks off Newfoundland under the command of Capt. William Vardy.

The Burwolf, a side trawler, has such features as an all-aluminum refrigerated fish hold with a capacity of 300,000 pounds, modern navigational aids, fishscope to help locate fish, and air conditioning for the crew's quarters.

The boats are powered by 60-horsepower diesel marine engines and have a speed of 11 knots. They are designed for a crew of 15.

The keel for the Burwolf was laid last September and she was launched in December.

Telephone Deal Is Explained

OTTAWA (CP)—Terms of an agreement under which the Bell Telephone Co. of Canada shares the benefits of research done by the American Telegraph and Telephone Co. were explained in detail before the Board of Transport Commissioners.

The board is holding lengthy public hearings into Bell's financial status with a view to possible revision of its permissive level of earnings.

D. A. Dobson, general accountant for AT and T and Wallace C. Macpherson, Bell vice-president for revenue, told how AT and T research is done and the use Bell makes of it. It costs Bell about \$5,000,000 a year.

Among the submissions filed was an agreement signed by Bell last June in which the Canadian company in a way conceded it would not make any of the research available to Communist countries.

Opening lead—king of hearts. Bridge is a serious business if you aim for perfection. You can't let your attention wander for a second or the first thing you know you've missed your cue and something terrible happens.

Take this hand played in a par contest some years back. The slam was easy to bid, but when it comes to the play, most of the declarers missed their cue.

The king of hearts was the required opening lead—the play then usually went ace of hearts, A-K of spades, and A-K-Q of diamonds. When the

diamonds failed to break 3-3, declarer took a double finesse in clubs. East captured the ten with the jack and returned a heart. South ruffed and took another club finesse for down one.

Of course, South was unlucky. Diamonds didn't break right and both club finesses lost. However, you must expect such things to happen once in a while, especially in par contests.

The general idea of the game is to play a hand in such a way—if possible—that even bad luck can't beat you, or in case a loophole actually exists, to try to reduce the element of luck to the smallest conceivable fraction.

Making the slam is easy as pie. All you have to do after winning the ace of hearts is ruff a heart. The importance of doing this may not be altogether obvious, but it is nonetheless highly essential.

Then, after drawing trumps and taking three rounds of diamonds, East showing out, the hand becomes a lead-pipe cinch. You lead a club and finesse the ten.

East wins with the jack but he may as well go to the movies. The heart isn't in dummy a ny more and he doesn't have a diamond to lead. He must therefore return a club into the A-Q, or else a heart, which you ruff in one hand while discarding a club from the other.
