MEETING AT GRAND VIEW.

The meeting held at Grand View on Saturday evening last, was a very large one and strongly in favor of the Liberal-Conservative candidate.

Mr. D. A. McKinnon was the next speaker. He wished to be elected because he had been defeated last fall and Mr. Martin had helped to secure his defeat.

He was followed by A. A. McLean, M. L. A., who made one of the most telling speeches of the campaign in this district. So strongly was the sentiment of the meeting with him that no interruption, however slight, would be tolerated.

As the hour was late Mr. D. P. Irving was the last speaker. He made a most remarkable statement viz, "A Government which could not make ends meet should be turned down and out." In view of the fact that he was a candidate last autumn in support of the Farquharson government which has a debt of about \$600,000, he either does not believe what he then said or does not mean what he says now.
