Expelling Reporter Seen 'Politically Dangerous'

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal's two English-language newspapers have commented editorially on Premier Duplessis' action in expelling a Montreal Le Devoir reporter from his legislative office last Friday before the start of his weekly press conference.

At the 1 1/2-hour conference which followed Mr. Lamarche's ouster, Mr. Duplessis said "judicial procedures" will be taken against Le Devoir as a result of the articles.

"This is, politically though not constitutionally, a dangerous thing to do," said the Montreal Star. "The prime minister has not acted with his usual fairness towards the press," said the Montreal Gazette. "When a press conference is called, all have an equal right to attend.

The Gazette said: "The annoyance felt by the prime minister may be understood. The presence of the representative of the newspaper making such charges against members of his cabinet might well have been felt as an exasperation.

CBC Plans Broadcast Of S' Side Lobster Carnival

The CBC will originate a 10-minute broadcast from the Summerside Lobster Carnival on Saturday, July 19th, at 5.45 p.m. It was reported by carnival director Charles Hogan at a short meeting of the carnival committee last evening.

The broadcast will go to the full Trans-Canada network which means it will be heard from coast to coast.

The meeting, presided over by general chairman, Edgar Cannon, agreed to the purchasing of 12 medals for the winners in the junior events in the 100, 200, 400, and 800-yard events in the track and field meet. This Maritime invitation meet is handled by the Summerside Rotary Club with Vaughan Groom as chairman and it was pointed out that the contestants in the junior events will be local boys who will be rewarded for the efforts by receiving medals.

Mr. Hogan reported the possibility of two army "ducks" being in Summerside during the carnival to take passengers for rides on land and in the water. "Ducks" are amphibious craft that are equally at home in the water or on land and these two, from Nova Scotia, will carry about 25 adults or 33 children.

Ben Champion, who will act as parade marshal, reported that only six floats have been entered for parades so far and expressed disappointment in this regard. However, it was felt that there will be several more floats entered before the carnival gets underway.

Without a doubt, this third annual Lobster Carnival is destined to be the biggest yet with large numbers of out of province residents in Canada and many from the United States planning to take in at least some of the events.

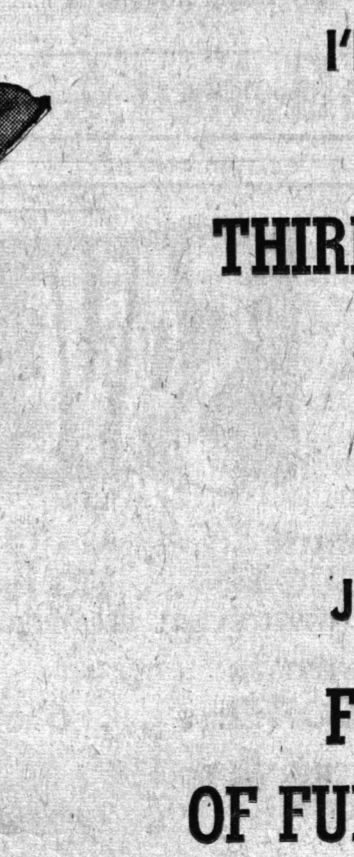
