Immigration Run Is Curbed

By JOHN E. BIRD Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP) — New regulations affecting some countries have been put into effect to curb the immigration influx of all but the closest relatives of Canadian residents.

The immigration department said Thursday the new rule went into effect Wednesday by cabinet order-in-council. It prohibits Canadians or legal residents of Canada from sponsoring brothers and sisters and married sons and daughters who are citizens of Europe, Israel, Lebanon, Turkey, South America, Mexico and Central America.

The prohibition also includes the husband or wife and the unmarried children under 21 of any such son, daughter, brother or sister.
