The Money-Order Business.

By a convention recently held between the Postmaster General of the United States and the Postmaster General of the Dominion, the system of money-order business between these two countries has been improved and simplified, while the cost of remitting has been reduced.

The rates of commission on money orders on the United States are now:

For any sum not exceeding \$10,	10cts
Exceeding \$10 and not exceeding 20,	20
" 20 " " " 30,	30
" 30 " " " 40,	40
" 40 " " " 50,	50

This reduced rate has been in use since the 1st instant, and persons receiving money from friends in the United States, or remitting to them, should take advantage of the absolute safety secured by Post Office orders, as a means of transferring money. If they did so, we should have no more cases of missing money letters. The number of persons who still send money in unregistered letters is almost incredible; but those who will still risk it in that way do not deserve any sympathy when they meet with a loss which they could so easily avoid by obtaining a money order.

Model Farm Buildings.

The Commissioners have decided that new farm buildings should be erected on the Model Farm; and, we are glad to learn, the Government are deliberating about the matter. Plans and specifications of the farm buildings erected by the late Hon. George Brown are, we understand, under consideration, and are likely, with some modifications, to be adopted. It is, indeed, pleasing to learn that a Government of this agricultural Province are, at last, giving particular attention to the improvement of agriculture. To obtain an increase of thoroughbred farm stock, especially cattle and sheep, should be our first care; and it is a pity that, for want of good buildings, those now in possession of the Government cannot be well cared for, and their number increased to meet the increasing wants of farmers in all parts of the Province.

Information Wanted.

FREQUENT inquiries have been made during the last few weeks as to the time and place of running of the good steamer *Scud*. This boat is supposed to run—and, for aught we know to the contrary, does run—weekly between Pictou, Georgetown, Souris, and the Magdalen Islands, for the purpose of carrying mails, passengers and freight. Of the service, which this steamer is well paid to perform, the public is kept in comparative ignorance, merely to save the few dollars and cents it would cost to advertise. She is said to leave Pictou every Wednesday on arrival of the morning train from Halifax. Her arrival at Georgetown was looked for some time during the same day; and at Souris she was expected to put in an appearance some time during the night, say about twelve o'clock—a very convenient time, indeed, for the public. As her arrival was uncertain, her departure was equally so, sometimes remain-

ing an hour, at other times leaving instant. Within the last week, it is said, a new arrangement has been made. From Wednesday the *Scud* has changed it is said, her day for Georgetown and Souris to Friday. Whether this is the case or not, we are not prepared to state. This much we know, that, in the interest of the travelling public, the owner of the *Scud* should advertise in some popular paper—such, for instance, as the DAILY EXAMINER.

Delegates from the Old Country.

An Ottawa dispatch to the St. John *Telegraph* informs us that: "In August next a fresh batch of tenant farmer delegates will arrive here. The Marquis de Lorne has requested the Kintyre and Ayrshire Agricultural Association, of Scotland, to send out representatives."

We hope that these delegates will not be suffered to depart from Canada before they pay a visit to Prince Edward Island. There is no Province in Canada in which a limited number of old country farmers would find, on the whole, a better opening than here; and it is quite certain that if a few of them were to settle down among us, they could show our people a beneficial example. It is safe to say that, though we now do pretty well, our productions could be increased threefold if the higher systems of agriculture, as practiced in the Mother Country, were adopted by our farmers.

The Joke of the Day.

THE letters of Messrs. Heard and McLeod anent the EXAMINER'S notice of their case, have given rise to much good humored pleasantry. Charlottetown to Let—(Continued)

To the Editor of the Examiner.

MR. EDITOR.—Perhaps the diction of my first letter is too quaint, and some of the matter too ancient to suit the taste of many of your numerous readers. A few others will probably object neither to the quaintness nor antiquity of the matter. The latter class of people will be found among the eldest of your patrons. Most of these know of what I write. I could mention a thousand other reminiscences of Charlottetown, which took place between 1847 and 1860 which would make the ears of our young men tingle, if they take any interest in the past events and condition of their native town. But to enumerate all these would be to write a history of Charlottetown during the thirteen years referred to. This I may do if spared a little longer. In this letter I must confine myself to the main object I had first in view.

As stated in my former letter, we have, in this town, a few factories which are a credit to the enterprising mechanics who established them, and a direct benefit to the country. Of these factories, five of the principal ones are in active operation. Six or seven others are working on a more limited scale. About as many more, which at one time existed, have gone down from several causes. I prefer not to mention the names of the parties immediately concerned in these three classes of factories, for, to do so, would be considered invidious to some of them.

Now, what we want, in addition to the factories now at work in Charlottetown, is others of a different kind, and which the changes and circumstances of the times require. In different parts of the country, enterprising men have formed themselves into companies, and are establishing starch factories. Others have established lobster factories several years ago, and new ones are still springing up. I know of no factory that has yet failed, although one, at least, has passed through a fiery ordeal, to one of our foremost Charlottetown Furniture Factories.

The ostensible cause assigned for establishing starch and lobster factories in out of the way country places is, that there the raw materials are near at hand, and must, therefore, be more easily and cheaply procured. This is only partially, if all true. In a few localities far from Charlottetown and other good shipping places, potatoes may be bought slightly cheaper. But in the city, they are as cheap as in most parts of the country, where these factories are being built; and, besides, the market is more steady and permanent. But above all, the town possesses a centrality which no country locality can enjoy. This alone is a most important element in the success of any factory.

Now, why do not our monied men form themselves into a company and get up both a starch and a lobster factory. All the raw materials are within easy reach, and working hands never more plentiful and more easily got. If these factories pay in the country, why not in the city! The hands employed would spend their earnings

amongst us, and a portion of this money would find its way into every pocket; even into the pockets of their employers. These workpeople would require tenements, and would occupy, at least, the greater part of those "To Let."
