Tickets for the Provincial C.W.L. Art Drawing were then distributed to the members and the meeting was adjourned. The entertainment committee served a lovely luncheon.

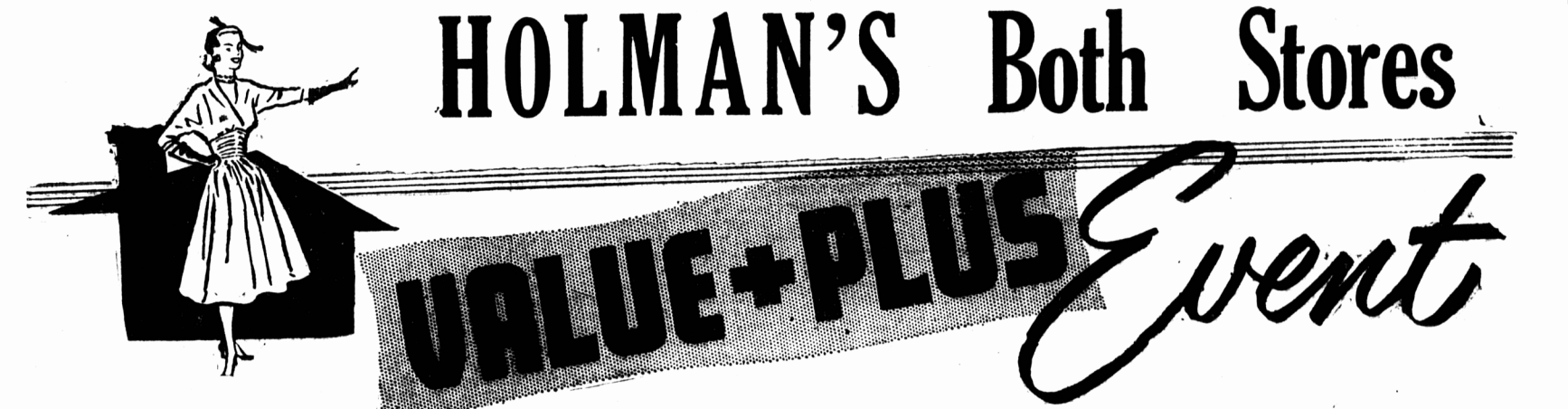

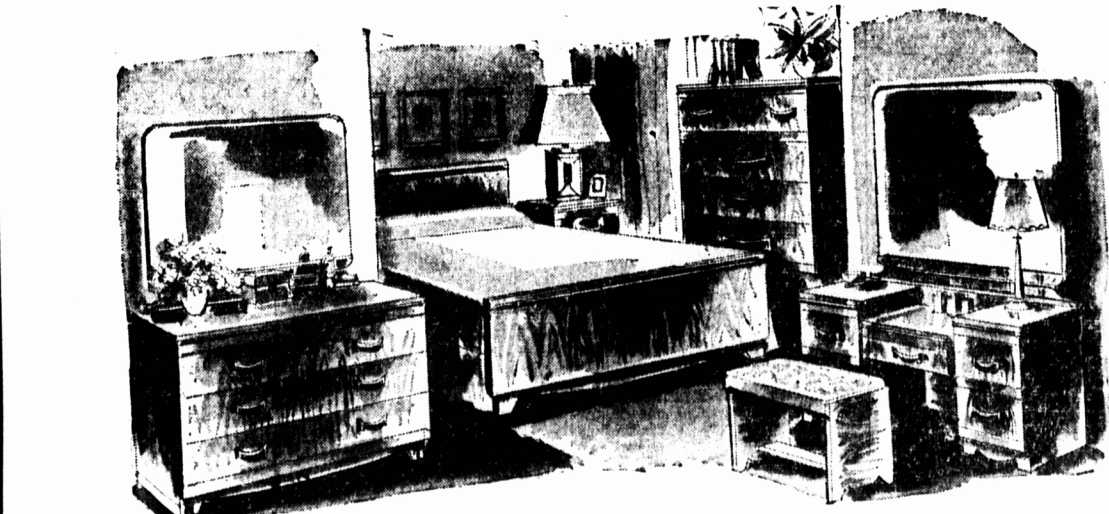
