Driver Absolved By Coroner's Jury

A coroner's jury convened in Charlottetown last night to enquire into the death of Martin Ross, 55, of Flat River, concurred in the verdict of the coroner which struck the deceased, as the blame. The jury reached its verdict in about 20 minutes. The text of the verdict was "that Martin Ross came to his death on Aug. 28, 1962, as a result of multiple injuries received when struck by a motor vehicle in the vicinity of Flat River and driven by Donald Charles MacKenzie. Martin Ross died at a point somewhere between Flat River and Charlottetown. We attach no blame to the driver." Seven witnesses were called to testify by the coroner, Dr. C.A. Coady.

Donald Charles MacKenzie, Flat River, driver of the car which struck Mr. Ross, stated that on the morning of Sunday, Aug. 26, he was driving toward his home in Flat River, accompanied by his wife and children and another couple.

Suddenly within a few feet of the accident he saw a man walking on the pavement about halfway between the edge of the pavement and the centre of the highway. Witness stated that he slowed down and started to swing the car over to the left when the pedestrian also moved toward the left.

MacKenzie said he then applied further pressure on his brakes and swung his car over to the right and into the ditch on that side, but in passing hit Mr. Ross.

He said that Dr. Louis Bonnell arrived on the scene and examined the injured man and then ordered him taken to hospital in Charlottetown.

Asked by Deputy Attorney-General Arthur McLaughlin, what kind of clothing Mr. Ross was wearing, the witness said it was dark clothing and it was a clear night and the road was not slippery.

WAS NORMAL Howard Hancock, Flat River, who was a passenger in the MacKenzie car, corroborated the evidence of the previous witness and further stated that Mr. Bennett's driving was quite normal.

James Beaton, Flat River, told he was being awakened by the noise of car wheels or brakes, and on looking out of a window in his home saw a car in the ditch. When he arrived on the scene he saw Mr. Ross lying

as the Rangers downed the Western League Vancouver Canucks 10 in an exhibition tilt. "He came here from Seprine, Sask., so he could give me his decision in person," said the referee.

"His decision had nothing to do with money. We had offered him a salary better than anything he had ever received before. He simply didn't think he could help us."

Navigator Gets Jailed

BURNHAM ON CROUCH, England, Aug. 20 (AP)—A yachtman Andrew Heiskell, 29, made a slight navigational error and steered himself into jail. Sailing down the River Crouch for the Mediterranean on a stolen yacht, he turned left at the North Sea instead of turning right. He and his crew of three ended up in misty Brighthelmston, an off-shooting port of the Colne River estuary about 40 miles northwest of London, instead of sunny Italy. Heiskell pleaded guilty to stealing the \$19,600 yacht belonging to businessman Peter Ny.

Prosecutor Thomas Lavette told the court Wednesday that Heiskell had been a cruise to the Mediterranean and three unsuspecting youths among the passengers. Heiskell, not knowing the yacht had been stolen. The judge ordered Heiskell held and ruled the crew not guilty.

DETROIT (CP)—Detroit Red Wings ran their player count to 18 Thursday when Ed Joyal, Alex Faulkner and Ed Howie Young signed contracts for the 1962-63 National Hockey League season.

Joyal, 22-year-old defenseman, played last two years at Edmonton as a member of the Western League Flyers. Last season he was traded to the 26-year-old Faulkner, a centre from Bishop's Falls, Nfld., and Howie Young, a right wing from the 1961-62 season in the American League.

Young, 25-year-old defenseman, played with the Wings and Edmonton Flyers last season after joining the NHL club from Hershey of the AHL.

Credit Union Merger Proposed For Ch'town

A proposal for a merger of credit union branches in the Charlottetown area, to provide full-time credit union services to all persons residing or doing business in Greater Charlottetown, and to any other persons in the province wishing to obtain credit union services, was discussed at a meeting held Wednesday night at Prince of Wales College.

Representatives of five credit unions in Charlottetown, participating in the discussion, regarding the application for a charter for a province-wide credit union, with head office at 84 Queen St.

The meeting, sponsored by the P.E.I. Credit Union League, was conducted by the league president, Edmond Galant, Oyster Bed Bridge. Speakers included Greg Kelly, league manager; Urban LeBlanc, extension worker; Donald MacKenzie, CUNA Mutual Insurance representative; and Reid Sangster and Al Bellevue, of the Co-Op Housing Corporation.

A portrayal of credit union services, thrift, borrowing, education, insurance, promotion and affiliated services was given to the approximately 35 persons attending from a cross-section of credit unions in the province.

TO BE STUDIED The proposal to merge was given approval in principle, but will be a subject for further discussion by the boards of directors of existing Charlottetown credit unions.
