

# Saints Defeat Raiders 59-45

Team Captain Lorne MacGuigan, star forward with Saint Dunstan's, paced his team to a 59-45 victory over U.N.B. Red Raiders last evening in a regular N.B.P.E.L. Intercollegiate Basketball League tilt at S.D.U. gym.

This was the first loss for the Red Raiders in three starts. The Saints having won one and lost two, still have an outside chance of chopping the league crown. The local collegians avenged a defeat suffered a week previous at the hands of the U.N.B. five. At that time MacGuigan, just recovering from a bout with the flu which had laid him up for over a week, was not as effective as usual. Starry center Gerry Tingley was also missing from the Saints' lineup in that fixture.

MacGuigan last evening racked up a total of 26 points, the highest individual total of the game. The scoreboard at half time read 29-19 for the red and white five but in the second half the Raiders closed the gap almost completely and with only a few minutes remaining were trailing by only 4 points.

However, a scoring spurge by the Saints in these dying minutes widened their lead for good. Lanky center Morgan was top sniper for the losers. He picked up 13 points and teammate McHugh, trailing close behind.

# MacDonald Rink Captures British Consols Trophy

Three tension-packed victories in a row brought the Jiggs MacDonald rink to the port of last desire, the winning of the British Consols Trophy at the Summerside curling rink last night.

The rink, skippered by MacDonald, with Doug Cameron throwing last rock, had to win it the hard way against Myron Bell's foursome, who had surprised everyone with their play in the bonspiel.

The champs eliminated the Dr. Wendell MacDonald rink in the semi-finals in the 12 noon draw, paving the way for the final struggle.

The Bell and MacDonald rink fought neck and neck for nine ends in the semi-finals until the eventual winner broke it wide open with four points in the 10th.

Two beautiful cold draws by Myron Bell had kept the MacDonald rink out of 4 and 3 counts in two of the ends, but after the 4-rock spurge the MacDonald team played a strictly knockout game and Bell's rink conceded after placing one in the 11th end.

The MacDonald rink went into a 4-0 lead after two ends in the final game for the trophy and shifted once again to the knockout rinks.

The rinks took turns at scoring single points until the 6th, which was blank. Then the winner scored 2 in the seventh and 1 in the eighth to grab a commanding lead.

The Bell rink came back fighting, with a big 3 in the ninth, but they were still trailing 9-6 going into the twelfth and Jiggs and his men kept the house clear until his opponents conceded victory.

In the absence of Dr. Wendell MacDonald, president of Prince Edward Curling Association, the presentation of prizes to the winners and runners-up was made by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell with Frank "Duck" Acorn acting as master of ceremonies.

Mr. Campbell expressed the opinion that the curling in this bonspiel was the best ever seen in Prince Edward Island. He congratulated the MacDonald rink in winning the uphill fight to the championship and made reference to the fact that three of the rink personnel, Art Burkes, George Dillon and Doug Cameron, were formerly on schoolboy curling championship teams.

He also complimented the Bell foursome—Roach MacGregor (lead), Gordon Stewart (2nd stone), Jim Cameron (mate) and skip Myron Bell—for the good play during the bonspiel.

Consolation prizes were presented to section "B" winners, Harry Dickie (skip), Harold MacLeod (mate), Enzor Bowness (2nd stone) and Earl Cannon (lead).

The Hall of Fame of the Trotter, at Goshen, New York, will conduct an exhibit in conjunction with the annual meeting of District 9 of the United States Trotting Association at the Sheraton Hotel, Albany, N.Y., on February 19.

The display in the hotel lobby will be the third the museum has provided for the meeting of the district comprising New York State. It had exhibits at the 1956 and 1957 meetings.

Agnes Gahagan, director of the Hall of Fame, and Philip A. Pines, curator, have advised that this year's exhibit will include a large weather vane of the former world's champion trotter, Maude S., hitched to a high two-wheeler; a painting of an 1831 trotting race, under saddle; an oil painting of the 1957 harness horse of the year, Torpid; and a small diorama of the fabled pacer, Dan Patch, and a group of Currier and Ives productions.

The Hall of Fame of the Trotter, which also includes pacers, was the offshoot of an idea conceived by E. Roland Harriman,

whose father was a lover of trotters and had world's champions during his lifetime. E. Roland followed in his footsteps and was one of the men responsible for bringing the different track organizations together to form the United States Trotting Association.
