The rest of the excitement generated around the picture stems from the fact that Autry plays his first dual role on the screen.

Gene portrays himself, as a range rider, and he also appears as mustached Sheriff Steve Autry, his father, in an exciting flashback sequence of importance to the plot. As Sheriff Steve, Gene arrests and jails a bandit gang, but is unable to find the \$30,000 loot collected by them in a hold-up. When the bandits escape from jail, two decades later, and hunt up their stashed-away treasure, they run into Gene, Gene, of course, is plenty tougher than Sheriff Steve, even if he does occasionally burst into song.
