## THE LATE WENDELL GRAHAM

The death of Wendell Graham of Quinicy City Hospital, Quinicy, Mass., on Monday, January 29, 1962, marked the death of a distinguished citizen and one of Prince Edward Island's prominent business men.

The deceased was born at Peters Road, P.E.I., Sept. 13, 1895, the only son of the late George Graham and Elizabeth Johnston Graham. He attended the Penbrooke Public School and the Charlottetown High School.

He was married to Mrs. Irene, nee West, on July 23, 1918. He married Jane Boyde MacLure, daughter of the late William MacLure and Minnie MacLure of Murray Harbor North. For several years prior to joining the R.F.C. and again on being discharged from the R.F.C. Mr. Graham was the proprietor of the "Wendell" for all who knew him - was well known as a successful farmer at Grandpreux where he had a 100-acre farm formerly operated by his grandfather.

He was a member of the Canadian Legion, Montague Branch and the Independent Order of Foristlers, Hillside Lodge No. 138, Montague, P.E.I.

Some ten years ago he underwent a series of major operations which left his health somewhat impaired. However, he worked continually, with exception of short periods of time taken off for medical checkups at local hospitals, until the middle of November 1961, when he became seriously ill and on Nov. 18th he was admitted to Quinicy City Hospital, where, despite the best medical skill and tender nursing care, he passed away on the afternoon of January 29, 1962.

Besides his sorrowing wife he is survived by two sons, Gordon Grant and Gerald MacLure, their wives, Mae and Alice, and eight grandchildren: Heather Robert, Gordon, Glenda, Maurice, Patricia, Linda and Gerald Jr.

His funeral was held Friday, February 2, 1962 from Murray Harbor North Presbyterian Church where the service was conducted by Rev. M. Carl Currier, assisted by Rev. A. G. J. Steeves. During the service the choir sang "Will There Be Any Stars In My Crown," "Hymns were: "Jesus Savior Pilot Me," and "Softly and Tenderly." His assistants in the operation of this equipment will be Lewis Champion and Charles Steele.

Two ladies, Mrs. Pat Johnston and Mrs. Gerlie Cahill, will alternate afternoon and evening shifts as "counter-control" operators. Their duties are important in the efficient operation of the alleys.

The counter control centre contains an electrical panel which provides instant and continuous information on the individual alleys. Here also is the public address system, and the main telephone system, reserve and waiting list control, the rental of bowling shoes and supervision of cloak check room.

NURSERY IS FEATURE A special feature of Crest Lanes bowling centre is the nursery under the supervision of Mrs. Cliff Ramsay. Here mothers may leave their children free of charge, to play with a variety of things that have special appeal to the youngsters, classes in Toronto and will be a great one to six, who can be charged or to amuse themselves while their mothers are bowling.
