The death occurred at his home, 279 Richmond Street yesterday afternoon of Mr. Alfred C. Duchemin in his 91st year. Born in Charlottetown, the son of Albert Duval Duchemin and his wife Jemima Compton, his life was spent in this City where he is well and favourably remembered in business and church circles. With his brother the late Ernest Duchemin, he owned and operated until his retirement the wood-working factory known as the A.C. Duchemin and Company establishment located at the foot of Prince Street. Mr. Duchemin was a life long member of the Methodist, later Trinity United Church. He served faithfully on many church boards, having been for many years a teacher in the Sunday School and Steward of Relief Fund. At the time of his death he was the senior member of the Trustee Board. Since the time of Church Union in 1925 he has been consistently faithful and active member of the Session.

Mr. Duchemin was twice married. His first wife was Miss Alice Turner. Some years after her death, he married Mrs. Martha Wright Rogers. He leaves to mourn his passing a daughter, Dorothy (Mrs. Alvah Green) of Trinidad and a son, Warren J. Duchemin, professor at Prince of Wales College. Two brothers, Ernest and Harry predeceased him. A brother Frank M. Duchemin resides in Portland, Oregon.

A Statement By The Charlottetown Retail Merchants' Association Regarding Business Hours

The Charlottetown Retail Merchants' Association was formed on June 1, 1954. One of the main objectives of the Association was that the Charlottetown Retail Merchants could, through this Association, establish uniform business hours for all members.

At a general meeting of the Association held at City Hall on Feb. 8, 1955, a motion was made concerning new business hours for the Summer months. The motion was carried and new store hours were adopted until Sept. 1, 1955. As we all know, a number of the members did not abide by the majority vote; however, that is past history.

On August 11th last, another general meeting was held with a large membership present. A secret ballot was taken as to whether the new business hours would be continued or should the stores revert to the old business hours. Before this ballot was counted, the chairman pointed out to the meeting that it was useless to take this vote unless the members of the Association were willing to abide by the result of the majority vote; he brought to the attention of those present the disadvantages to both the buying public and the merchants in trying to operate on two different schedules. Therefore, a motion was put "that all those in favor of abiding by the majority vote signify their approval". This was carried unanimously with not a single "nay" vote. The ballots were then counted and the majority was in favor of retaining the new store hours—(open all day Wednesday, open Friday evening, closing at noon Saturday).

It is now evident, however, that a small minority group of the members again have no intention of abiding by the wishes of the Association, although it is always understood in any democratic organization that the majority vote rules. The Charlottetown Retail Merchants' Association has no intention of being ruled by a very small majority. THE WISH OF THE ASSOCIATION AS DECLARED BY THE VOTE WILL BE CARRIED THROUGH AND THE PRESENT BUSINESS HOURS WILL BE RETAINED.
