## APEC Understanding Stressed By Directors

The need of increasing the depth of understanding of the purpose of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council was stressed at a meeting of the island board of directors at the Charlottetown Motel last night. Many of the directors pointed out that people are not aware of the work APEC has done or what it is doing.

Major items on the agenda of the meeting, chaired by Capt. Claude Hunter, P.E.I. vice-president, included the finalizing of plans for a one-day workshop on membership and public relations to be held in Charlottetown Oct. 2. It will be chaired by Ross MacKenzie of Summerside. Also discussed was the annual meeting of APEC, which will be held in Fredericton, Oct. 15 and 16.

Directors attending included George LaBelle, J. A. Lileky, George Chandler, Rev. V. G. Murnaghan, A. D. Cameron, all of Charlottetown; J. Lincoln Dewar, New Perth; Charles Yeo, Summerside; A. M. Johnston, Burlington; and Paul Gallant, Souris.

A nominating committee composed of Mr. Chandler, Mr. LaBelle, Mr. Johnstone and Mr. Dewar, brought in a slate of directors, which will be presented to the annual meeting at Fredericton. Of the names of 24 directors on the list, 20 were re-elected from the last year and four new names were added. The members decided to look into the matter of sponsoring.

Committee Walter Cox and Town Planning Engineer Walter Desilva accompanied the Mayor, Councillor Cox Monday.

The meeting is expected to conclude today.

## Spacecraft Hoisted On Big Rocket

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Astronaut Walter M. Schirra's Sigbee 3 spacecraft was hoisted back atop its Atlas booster rocket Wednesday after a five-day removal for repairs.

Preparations then began with a goal of launching Schirra on an intended six-day orbit flight Oct. 2.

The shot, most ambitious yet planned by the U.S., had been set for Sept. 28, but a faulty selector valve showed up in the capsule last Friday. The space agency had to remove the capsule to a hangar, necessitating a five-day delay.

The six-orbit flight is to last nine hours, 11 minutes, nearly twice the time spent aloft by U.S. space pilots John Glenn and Malcolm Scott Carpenter. Schirra is to land in the Pacific northeast of Midway Island.

## Edmonton Pair Are Convicted In Murder Case

EDMONTON (CP) — Two Edmonton men were convicted Wednesday of murdering a man whose body has not been found. A 36-year-old Alberta Supreme Court jury, after two hours and 26 minutes of deliberation, found Raymond Workman and William Husack guilty of capital murder. Workman and Husack were charged with murdering Frank Wilkey, an Edmonton golf professional who vanished mysteriously last spring.

Mr. Justice J. H. V. Milvain said the lack of a body does not destroy the Crown's case. Wilkey disappeared April 19, while delivering a set of his own golf clubs ordered by a phone. His body has not been found.
