Lobster Catches Running Behind

Varying slightly from one fishing centre to another, the reports yesterday indicates that lobster catches are well down from those of last year. Prices being quoted are 40 cents for canners and 55 cents for markets.

Morell appears to be the brightest spot, and with two weeks to go fishermen there report the catch will equal that of a year ago. They anticipate that because of the higher price their overall return will be greater.

But from most other fishing centres the picture is not so rosy, with catches reportedly down by some 20 percent of that of last year. In some cases the catches are over 50 per cent down.

DOWN IS PER CENT
North Rustico is down about 20,000 pounds or 15 per cent from the landing this time a year ago, and that is with two more boats fishing this year.

They are getting only about five per cent of market lobster. Catches are said to be away

down both at Alberton and Tignish with some of the gear landed at Tignish and others hauling their traps only every second day. Most fishermen in the two areas are said to be getting ready to begin cod fishing.

"It's an off year in this area of the North Side," said a spokesman from the North Lake area where there are 92 boats fishing. Only one boat took more than 100 pounds Sunday and the rest were below that with several boats taking only 45 to 50 pounds, it was learned. They are paying 40 cents for canners and 55 cents for markets in that area, one buyer said.

Catches continue to be poor on the South side and average catches of 200 pounds compared with 400 to 500 last year, a spokesman from the fishermen's co-operative said.

The season's catch will be down 30 to 40 per cent unless the fishing picks up sharply in the last two weeks of the season, one man stated.
