## European Common Market Chance Seen For Britain

By HAROLD MORRISON LONDON (CP) — Through joint production with France, Britain eventually may be able to edge into the European Common Market without taking out Common Market membership. This appears to be the principal possibility arising from Prime Minister Wilson's two-day Paris meeting with President de Gaulle. The meeting has been hailed both in the British and French press as the beginning of a new era of friendship between the two countries.

In a joint communique, Wilson and de Gaulle said there had been British-French agreement on extensive co-operation in military and civil aviation construction and other "sophisticated technologies." The meeting was the first between France and Britain at the top level since France vetoed British membership in the Common market in 1963.

The meeting is to be followed by a rapid flow of cross-channel ministerial talks to explore how the new "entente cordiale" is to be expanded. Any expansion is likely to be mainly in the economics field. The two leaders indicated they still are as far apart as ever on such sensitive foreign policies as the war in South Viet Nam, the nuclear force for the North Atlantic Alliance as well as the future of the alliance itself.

Neither the communique, issued after the talks Saturday, nor Wilson's press conference that followed gave any indication de Gaulle would come to London as a return for Wilson's trip to Paris.

France, a top member of the six-country common market, has the sales potential. Britain has high performance engine skills. Wilson stepped away from signing a joint production treaty with de Gaulle; both countries agreed the door will be open for other countries to join in their plan later.

It was evident, however, initially the main co-operation would be between Britain and France. It was evident also if France is to gain from this co-operation, it may have to ease its pressure on the British pound which, Wilson emphasized, will not be devalued.

Before going to Paris, Wilson has spoken in the Commons of what almost seemed to him as "an undeclared war in the monetary field." France had advocated a return to the gold standard and also had turned more of its United States currency holdings into gold. This, said Wilson, had led to counter-measures being taken by the U.S.

Anglo-French finance ministers will meet to explore ideas for expanding world financial credit or liquidity and here again the new spirit of friendship may reduce French pressures on declining British and American gold reserves.

#### Stock Market Volume Drops

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock market volume dried up to the smallest in five months as prices went through another hesitant week.

On the basis of averages and other indicators, the week was pretty much of a standoff.

The Dow Jones industrial average produced a small gain of 1.72 at 893.38.

In mild conflict with this, The Associated Press average of 60 stocks eased .1 to 335.6, its third straight weekly decline.

A glittering exception was General Motors, which advanced 1 1/2 to 101 1/2. This still left General Motors nearly a point below its high, but it reflected investment buying of a sort which usually indicates which way the wind is blowing.

VOLUME DROPS

On the other hand, traders went for some very low-priced issues, and this did not indicate a very solid market tone.

The sharp drop in volume seemed to detract from any real importance market-wise. Volume was 23,179,101 shares compared with 25,612,950 the previous week. This was the lowest volume since the week ended Oct. 31, 1964, when turnover was 23,154,970 shares.

As the U.S. income tax deadline of April 15 approached, another market factor became increasingly important. This was the fact that many taxpayers and investors are finding that they owe the federal government substantial sums because of under withholding of income during 1964. This is leading to a certain amount of selling of stock to meet tax payments, analysts said, and is likely to lead to more of the same as the closer the tax deadline is.

Good reports of auto sales and record steel production for the fourth straight week helped bolster the market backdrop. Rail stocks reacted somewhat confusingly to news that Interstate Commerce Commission examiners had given their approval to the proposed New York Central-Pennsylvania railroad merger.
