SUMMERSIDE — A circular, outlining the purpose of the 1964 and 1967 Centennial celebrations and what they mean to Canadians, has been distributed in the province. It is expected that the circular will be distributed in French and a similar pamphlet may be printed on Quebec's part in the Centennial celebrations.

The outline explains the Canadian heritage and how the Centennial will be celebrated. It also tells of the country's forefathers eventually led to Confederation. It also tells of the first meeting of the Maritime Provinces with Canada (Ontario and Quebec) at Charlottetown in September 1864 where the groundwork was laid for the formation of the Dominion of Canada in 1867.

It tells of the great men involved in the venture and when each province eventually joined the Dominion. F.E.I. was not admitted to Confederation until 1870.

Finally, the circular issues a challenge to all Canadians, young and old, to take part in the Centennial celebrations to make them a success that will live forever. The motto of the Canadian people and to straighten the ties between them.

CAN SOLVE PROBLEMS.
In a great many cases people can solve their problems on their own initiative — we're looking for a program very similar to that of the Scandinavian countries. This is an entirely new approach to our problems."

Electric Doherns Available To Cattlemen In Each County

The P.E.I. department of agriculture has purchased three sets of electric doherns and one set will be made available to farmers in each county free of charge. It has been learned.

The doherns are used for calves and normally the process can only be performed when the calf is between a few days old to a month. Because of the slow growth of the horns in beef animals, though, the doherning can be done when the calves are as much as six to possibly eight weeks of age, it has been learned from David Smith, fieldman for Kings County.

It is a simple operation which requires only about 15 minutes per calf and leaves a clean-headed calf which makes handling of the animal easier and safer, as well as preventing hookers, udders and carried hives.

Those wishing to use the instruments should get in touch with their fieldmen. David Peacock is fieldman for Queens County and Ernest Lindtner, who is stationed in the Summerside office, is the fieldman for Prince Edward.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Food and Drug Administration spokesman said Thursday a drug used in taking x-ray pictures of the gall bladder has been removed from the U.S. market after apparently being linked with possible cancer-causing effects. The drug, called cholecystography, was recalled from the market about a month ago by its manufacturer, Dr. Fogera and Company Inc., Hicksville, N.Y.
