

Alston Shatters Tradition In Completing All-Stars

CINCINNATI (AP) — Walter Alston, National League All-Star manager, broke with tradition Friday in completing his squad for the inter-league game Tuesday in St. Louis.

Alston picked Felipe Alou of Atlanta as his reserve first baseman, thereby passing up Philadelphia's Bill White, who was second to Willie McCovey of the Giants in the voting. Alou received votes as an outfielder in the players' balloting.

And the Dodger manager chose Ron Hunt of New York Mets as his backup second baseman, bypassing Bill Mazeroski of Pittsburgh, who finished behind Jim Lefebvre of the Dodgers, who will start at second.

Traditionally the players next in line in the balloting have been named to the All-Star squad.

Lefebvre was named to replace Houston's Joe Morgan, winner in the balloting, who is out of action with a broken forearm.

All-Americans Battle Today

ATLANTA (CP) — Jim Grabowski of Illinois and Donny Anderson of Texas Tech. two Green Bay, Wis., who reportedly cost the Packers close to \$1,000,000 million, will meet Saturday night as rivals in the All-American football game at Atlanta Stadium.

This game between star players from East and West, most of whom are signed by pro teams, is expected to attract a near-capacity crowd of 50,000 fans to the new park where the Braves play baseball and the Falcons will play NFL football.

After five years in Buffalo, N.Y., the American Football Coaches' Association has moved the game south.

Game time is 9:30 p.m. EDT. Grabowski, the crashing full-back who broke Red Grange's records at Illinois, will play for the Cardinals of the East team, coached by Duffy Daugherty of Michigan State.

Anderson, snared by Green Bay for a reported \$600,000 and a future rival to Paul Hornung, will share the West's left half-back job with Mike Garrett of Southern California, the Heisman Award winner. Coach Tommy Prothro of UCLA has listed Garrett as his starter.

Saturday's class at the Charlottetown Tennis Club group 4 will be cancelled due to the Summerside Invitational Tennis Tournament.

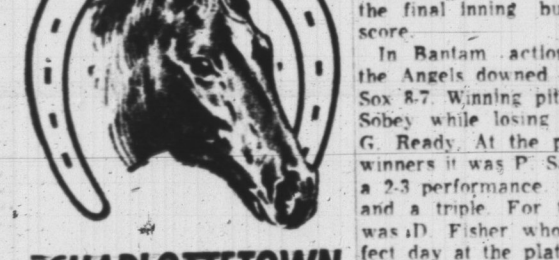
Another date will be given later for this group.

B. Barwise Tops Shooters In Second Day Of Meet

Shooting under almost ideal conditions Tpr. Bob Barwise of Charlottetown yesterday captured top spot in both the main matches of the day and the daily aggregate in the second day of the three day P.E.I. Rifle Association meet at Sault Ste. Marie.

Firing at 300 and 600 yard ranges Barwise registered an aggregate score of 120 out of 125 points to take the honors and trophy in the Macdonald Tobacco Co. match, edging out Tpr. Ronnie Clark by one point. Also a point behind Clark was WO2 Mike Sussick with 118 points.

To take first place in the second day's aggregate Barwise, in the four matches, fired during the day, registered a total of 262 out of a possible 275 point which earns him the Lt. Mary MacLennan Lea memorial trophy, donated in memory of her father, the late Seymour MacLennan.

Second place in the aggregate was taken by a veteran marksman from New Brunswick, WO1 George Lawrence of Sackville with a total of 257 points. Lawrence also captured top honors in the Rogers Hardware Co. match with a score of 48 out of 50 at 600 yards.

In the Moore and MacLeod match, fired at 200 yards, Col. A. M. Hughes of Fredericton, N.B. and president of the N.B. Rifle Association, registered a perfect possible 50 to gain top spot and the Patterson trophy.

He was followed closely by Sgt. Frank Sonier of Saint John, N.B. and Tpr. Fred White of Murray Harbor, each with a 49.

In the other event the Charlottetown Legion Match, Lt. L. S. Evans, a retired naval officer from Halifax, N.S. proved to be the winner with a score of 49 out of 50 at the 500 yard range.

In the Macdonald match, a trophy donated by the company in honor of Lt. Mary MacLennan Lea in being the first woman in Canada ever to qualify and travel to England with an official Rifle team, was won by Tpr. White, with a score of 115 out of 125.

Mare Armbro Flight Favored In Classic

WESTBURY, N.Y. (AP)—The coolness between Dancer and O'Brien goes back to the \$86,111 Realization Trot at Roosevelt June 25. In that race both Armbro Flight, the favorite, and Noble Victory went off stride at the first turn resulting in a victory for a \$47 long shot.

The four-year-old mare by Star's Pride out of Helicopter is the 5-2 choice in the advanced line to whip Noble Victory of the United States and six European trotters in a race that could produce a world record time for the 1 1/4 miles.

Pitted against Armbro Flight and Noble Victory, the second choice at 3-1, is Pluvier III, of Sweden, the surprise winner of the 1965 International, Roquepine and Quico of France, Pick Wick of West Germany, Merco of Norway and Carmelo of Italy. Roquepine is regarded as the best of the European contingent and is the third choice at 4-1.

A crowd of 50,000 is expected to see the race that is in the nature of a grudge affair between Stanley Dancer, driver of Noble Victory, and Joe O'Brien of Alberta, P.E.I. who will train Armbro Flight, owned by Armstrong Brothers of Brampton, Ont.
