### Nova Scotia's Health Plan No 'Ivory Tower' Is Claim

HALIFAX (CP)—Nova Scotia Health Minister Donahoe said Saturday the hospital insurance plan which will go into effect in the province next year is not an "ivory tower" operation. He told a press conference that two years of careful study went into selection of the plan and the method of paying for it—a three per cent sales tax—before an agreement was signed with the federal government three weeks ago.

Mr. Donahoe said the plan was designed to fill the "needs, and wants of all groups." Under the scheme the province will pay about 40-45 per cent of the cost and the federal government the remainder. Ottawa's share is worked out on the basis of 25 per cent of the average provincial cost and 25 per cent of the average national cost.

APPROVE 46 HOSPITALS  
Forty-six hospitals have been approved to participate in the plan. Only two were rejected. Neither was identified but both were described as remote rural institutions which failed to measure up to accepted hospital standards.

The plan will be administered by a commission headed by Halifax lawyer R. MacDonald Black, who is also managing director of the Amherst Daily News. It was estimated that the commission's permanent staff will grow to 40 and administration costs will average \$250,000 annually. Automobile and various other items are exempt from the three per cent tax, as are food, fuel and children's clothing up to a certain size. The tax, plus a five per cent levy on tobacco and liquor, is expected to yield about \$3,500,000 a year. Total cost of the scheme in 1959 was estimated at \$12,757,000.

PUBLICITY CAMPAIGN  
The commission, with headquarters in Halifax, will report to the health minister annually. Plans have been laid for an intensive campaign to acquaint the public with details of the scheme. One phase of the campaign will be mailing of 450,000 question and

## 'Pure Luck' Kept T.C.A. Passengers From Plane

NEW YORK (CP)—A big cargo plane charged out of control like an enraged elephant at Idlewild airport Monday, destroying a Trans-Canada Air Lines Viscount and endangering hundreds of lives.

Spewing flames, the Super-Constellation went amok on takeoff and headed for a busy terminal building while airport workers stood rooted in horror or sprinted for cover.

The Constellation, owned by Seaboard and Western Airlines, smashed into the standing TCA turbo-prop plane—engulfing both machines in fire—as two stewardesses, the only occupants of the Viscount, ran for their lives. No one was killed.

Only mercies of coincidence and timing prevented large-scale loss of life, officials said. Eight persons, including one of the stewardesses, suffered injuries, none serious.

DELAY—PURE LUCK  
Twenty-six passengers were lined up waiting to board the Montreal-bound Viscount. A TCA spokesman said that but for the delay—"pure luck"—they would already have been aboard.

"Six minutes more and the plane would have been loaded. It was in position, but there had been a slight delay."

The Constellation rammed the Viscount 20 feet from the concrete wall of the terminal, where scores of people stood in open-mouthed shock at the sound of the crash. The four-engine aircraft represented a total loss of \$3,000,000.

Orange flame boiled more than 50 feet into the grey autumn sky while sirens wailed their blood-chilling warning. Fire-fighters were on the scene almost instantly.

"We were awfully lucky—ter-

ribly lucky," said Austin J. Tobin, executive director of the Port of New York Authority, which operates Idlewild, this city's international airport.

TERMINAL THREATENED  
"The fire threatened the entire terminal. It's difficult to see why the terminal didn't catch fire."

The Constellation, on a training exercise with five crew members aboard, swerved off the runway and caught fire just at the point of takeoff and headed toward the built-up area while airport workers pointed and shouted. Two of its blazing engines fell off and rolled over and over. The crew escaped as the plane came to a halt.

Stewardesses Jannine Bedard, 23, of Montreal and "Arlin Foch, 21, a German immigrant, were preparing the Viscount for the flight when they saw various people making frantic gestures outside.

The girls hurried out to the ramp to investigate, then started a dash for safety when they saw the approaching Constellation. Miss Bedard was slightly injured by tripping over a rail fence.

The 26 passengers went to Montreal on two later flights.

Capt. Ralph Neary, 38, who was aboard but not at the controls of the cargo plane, said it wasn't known yet what caused the swerve.
