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## Gillis And Lewis blast PC 'bungling, disunity'

Canada is gradually losing all her friends in other countries after five years of "diplomatic bungling", Allison Gillis, Queens Liberal candidate, told a meeting in Eton Friday night.

Mr. Gillis, speaking to an audience of over 200 persons, said the world had held this country in high esteem while the now Liberal leader Lester B. Pearson was external affairs minister, but now held a low regard for Canada.

He said a Liberal government would have backed the United States immediately during the Cuban crisis. Latin America, he stated, stood solidly behind the U.S. against "their blood brother" the Cubans, while Canada took four days to decide whether it would back up the United States against threatened Communist aggression.

He added that the Liberal opposition urged decisive action at that time.

Referring to the last federal campaign, Mr. Gillis charged the Conservatives with "deciding" in portraying Canada as a pro-Communist country, stating that problems, when it was on the verge of bankruptcy.

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## Alta. Speaker Dises Muttony

EDMONTON (CP) — Rev. Peter Dawson, speaker of the Alberta Legislature, died suddenly of a heart attack in University Hospital here Sunday.

Mr. Dawson, a native of Scotland, was 70. He had represented Little Bow constituency as a Social Credit member since his party swept into power in 1955.

He was named Speaker of the Alberta Legislature two years later and was in his 26th consecutive year as Speaker.

## Steel Users Scrambling For Supplies

CLEVELAND (AP) — Steel users are scrambling for tonnage in preparation for a possible strike in the industry of mills are quoting longer deliveries and forecasting a higher price for steel.

The publication said steel makers expect their March shipments to be 20 per cent greater than last month and a similar increase in April. 15 per cent of the steel shipped this month will go into inventory, increasing stocks by nearly 1,000,000 tons, it added.

The longer the United Steelworkers of America postpones its decision on reopening the contract, the greater the likelihood that this year's inventory will be depleted, said Steel said. "Steel users who have delayed hedging because they lack storage space can't afford to gamble much longer."

The odds are against a labor settlement by April 1 and most observers doubt that agreement will be reached on the key employment security issue by April 30, the publication added.

The magazine forecast a ninth consecutive increase in steel in production this week. Last week's output was estimated at 2,200,000 tons, a 1.6-per-cent increase over the previous week.

Steel's price composite of No. 1 heavy melting grade steel making scrap was unchanged at \$24 a ton last week.
