## Dislodged Signs To Be Replaced

Mayor Howard S. MacLean presided over the regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Town Council held on Monday night in the council chambers, with Councillors Lavers, Currie, MacDonald, MacLean and Johnson in attendance. Reports were received from the chairman of the various committees, including Finance, Police, Welfare, Fire Hall and Streets.

The Police report showed the amount of \$80 collected in fines. It was reported that the chain link fence had arrived for the fencing of the town dump and this will now be erected. Arrangements were also made to have the dump area bulldozed and the general area cleared of papers, on the completion of the erection of the fence.

A number of additional speed signs and a speed warning sign will be obtained and erected and the chairman of the street committee informed the Council that stop signs, that had been dislodged from their location, would be erected. A close watch is to be kept on all traffic signs and anyone found interfering or dislodging the signs will be dealt with through the courts.

Negotiations are in the final stage on the financing of the town sewage project and progress payments will begin on work done.

The Council decided that due to anticipated government assistance not being available for the developing of a trailer park on East Street, that the planned sewage system to service this park would not now be proceeded with.

It was decided to proceed with the ditching and hauling of shale on that portion of Grafton Street from Victoria Street to East Street. The town has received the amount of \$744, from the Georgetown Centennial Committee, representing the town's centennial share based on the one dollar per capita figure. This amount will be used towards the cost of placing the fill on Kent Square.

The police officer reported several complaints regarding dogs attacking and biting persons but the persons involved have not as yet proceeded to lay a formal charge against the dog owners.

A request from Mrs. Elizabeth McGowan for the use of the council chambers for the months of June, July and August, during day time hours, for use as an office in connection with the Kings Theatre, was approved by the council.

Pulp wood still remaining on Gordon Street, will be removed and it was decided that no street work can be proceeded with on the portion of Gordon Street, between Fitzroy Street and Weeks Crescent, until a sewer line is laid.

An application of Frank L'andier requesting permission to erect two signs, at the entrance of the town, advertising the location of his log cabin park, was approved.

The Maritime Electric Company informed the council that it plans to proceed with the planting of trees on the site of its electrical sub-station, so that the area will present a more attractive appearance.

Other matters dealt with were: taxes; the termination of a lease of a property now leased by the town; the question of the termination of a lease of a room in the post office building; progress payments on sewer pipe, delivered to date; sewer lines excavated to date and the hauling of sewer pipe.

The facilities of the rink will be donated free of charge to the Georgetown Centennial Committee for their Lobster Supper on June 22.

## Minister Announces Increase

Hon. Hubert B. McNeill, minister of welfare and labor, announced yesterday that the provincial government will be making out the supplementary allowance promised at the end of June. ## Indian To Run For Manitoba Legislature

GRISWOLD, Man. (CP) - Vernon Mazawasciuna, a strapping Indian, wants to prove a point by becoming the first Indian member of the Manitoba legislature - that an Indian can do a good job representing all the people.

Mr. Mazawasciuna is the New Democratic Party candidate for Verden constituency in the June 23 Manitoba election.

"He chose the NDP banner, he said, because of the socialist record in Saskatchewan under T. C. Douglas - it was the only party looking after the interests of the Indians."

"I know farmers around here have problems, he added. I'm not going to promise so-and-so. It's better to work on the people's problems."

**DRIVES BUS**  
Fifty-one, a school bus driver, and the father of five children ranging from 14 years to 18 months, Mr. Mazawasciuna lives on the Oak River Indian Reserve five miles north of this southwestern Manitoba community.

He is seeking to capture the seat held in the last house by Progressive Conservative Morris McGregor. Mr. McGregor, who won with a majority of 1,505 in the Conservative government's 1962 election victory, is running again. Other candidates in the four-way fight are Liberal Roland Tolton and Social Credit's Donald Rowan.

His opponents are capable people, Mr. Mazawasciuna said. "But I think only I can speak for all the people here."

The Indian candidate was interviewed Thursday after he filed his nomination papers just half an hour before the deadline.

Chief Electoral Officer Charles Erudhomme said he does not know of any previous Indian candidates for the Manitoba legislature. Certainly none has been elected.

Though this is his first try at provincial office, Mr. Mazawasciuna has been active in reserve politics and this year missed by one vote becoming Oak River band chief in an election contest with Chief John Sioux.

He is on the board of directors of the Brandon Indian-Metis friendship centre and in his spare time coaches minor baseball and hockey teams. He also runs the projector for movies on the reserve.

Noting his 12-letter name will likely be the longest on the election ballots, Mr. Mazawasciuna said:

"I don't care if they don't know how to say it, as long as they put their vote beside it."

## Eatons Offer Concessions

TORONTO (CP) - Eatons of Canada Ltd. has offered concessions on its proposed downtown Toronto Eaton Centre, but remains firm that the old city hall must go eventually.

Eaton Centre's director, David Owen, told a combined meeting of board of control and Metropolitan Toronto executive Tuesday that developers are willing to shave 14 storeys off a planned 57-storey office building so it won't overshadow the new city hall.

But if the new skyscraper is squashed, he said it will have to spread out to have the same amount of floor space. This will force disposal of the old city hall clock tower which local historians had proposed saving.
