**Farm Grown and Commercial Feeds**

During recent years Canadian farmers have confined themselves as far as possible to the use of home-grown feeds, principally to avoid a cash outlay. In many cases, however, farm-grown feeds alone lack some of the essentials of well balanced rations, and may be wastefully fed if these essentials are not provided. Proteins, minerals and vitamins are the most commonly needed additions to farm grown feeds.

Recognising farmers' purchasing habits and needs, progressive feed manufacturers have catered to the situation by producing feeds specially prepared to supplement and balance farm-grown grains and roughages. In 1933, there were 136 brands of such concentrate mixtures registered under the Feeding Stuffs Act administered by the Seed Branch, Department.

The formulas of these mixtures are varied to suit the requirements of different classes of stock. Protein quantity and variety is supplied by meat and fish meals, gluten feed, linseed oil meal, soya bean oil meal and other materials rich in protein. Salt, bone meal, ground limestone, potassium iodide, ferric oxide and other ingredients are frequently included to provide minerals while vitamins are supplied by such materials as cod liver oil, pilchard oil and alfalfa meal.

**Canadian Garden Service**

Experienced gardeners claim that excessive losses or setbacks through transplanting are unnecessary. But they find this common job at their time of year rather carefully. Whether the plant being moved is a mere annual seedling a few inches high of a six-foot tree or shrub these experienced gardeners never expose the roots to the air anymore than they can possibly help.

In moving they keep the plants, roots and any soil attached, well moistened. They spread out the roots when replanting and press fine soil firmly around them. If the plant is any size they will usually add some water. Indeed frequent and copious watering at this time is the key to success. A stimulant in the way of commercial fertilizer rich in nitrogen is also advisable. With such plants as petunias, asters or tomatoes about as much fertilizer as can be held on a dime is sufficient. Experts urge that this be placed in the soil near, but not touching the roots and if possible the ground is soaked with water afterwards.

**Garden Fruits**

Even in the moderately sized city garden there is usually an odd corner where fruit may be produced. A cherry, plum or peach tree will take up a great deal of room. Under certain conditions where it is possible to furnish more than the usual protection most things can be grown far north of their ordinary environment. Certain trees, it is true, may succumb in a hard winter, but the trees are not expensive and are easily replaced. In fact, in certain conditions, many of the hardy apples, cherries, plums and almost innumerable berries have originated which will give abundant returns for the space occupied. Strawberries, gooseberries, currants, Saskatoon berries and cherries are all hardy. In garden fruits the beginner is advised to include more of these things which will produce fresh desserts or salads early in the season when it is difficult or expensive to get imported supplies. In this connection early cherries like the Richmond, early apples such as Yellow Transparent, St. Lawrence and Red Astrachan or some of the new varieties developed by the Experimental authorities are worth considering. Where space is very limited it is quite feasible, through grafting or budding to have several varieties of apples on a single tree. This applies to apples and pears especially.

**Climbers**

Creeping or Climbing plants play an important part in any scheme of landscape gardening, adding a finishing touch to wall, fence or verandah that is not possible by any other means. There is a mistaken idea that such plants may be harmful to brick or stone work but there are many buildings in the old lands which have been supporting ivies for centuries and the walls under these green mantles are said to be in an excellent state of preservation. Aside from the fact that climbers add a little trouble to the job of painting the woodwork around doors and windows, authorities claim that there are no harmful effects whatever but on the other hand there are several substantial advantages. A house with the walls well screened with Boston Ivy or in the colder sections of Canada, the hardier clinging type of Virginia Creeper, is much cooler in the hot weather for the simple reason that sun does not reach heat absorbing brick or stone. As for verandahs the advantage in shade, coolness and privacy of such natural screens is too obvious to

**Language No Bar To Poultry Meet**

According to the latest official information received in Canada and also from the published newspaper reports in Great Britain and in the principal European countries, active preparation for the Sixth World Poultry Congress is being pushed forward both by the government and by the breeders. The Congress will be opened at Leipzig, Germany, on July 24 by Der Reichsfuehrer Hitler. It is pointed out in the Continental press that the criticism often levelled against large international gatherings is the difficulty of translating the speeches and papers. This will not be the case in Leipzig during the World Poultry Congress this year. Special arrangements are being made whereby the hearer will be able to receive the report in his own language, no matter in what language it is made.

Another point called from the European press is that the Congress will give the non-German breeder an opportunity to sell pure-bred poultry. Breeders outside Germany will learn with interest that the German Congress Commission is disposed to give special prices for the purchase of foreign stock and that the necessary money to do so is at their disposal. This fact will add interest to what will be an exhibition of the world's famous poultry. Newspapers of France, Yugoslavia, Hungary, Greece, Czechoslovakia, and Ger-

barrels, either by emptying or screening them.

The Dominion Entomological Branch has prepared a circular dealing with mosquito control in Canada. This circular is available free on application to the Publicity and Extension Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. In the case of community campaigns, towns and villages contemplating action against these "mosq" to pests should write the Dominion Entomologist at Ottawa for direction and information.

**To Combat Mosquito Pests**

The Dominion Entomologist directs attention to the fact that much can be done by community action in reducing the number of mosquitoes which affect the comfort and health of citizens generally. Mosquitoes breed largely in temporary bodies of water, such as snow and rain pools and river flooded areas. They develop only in water, and the method of control which ultimately gives most satisfaction consists in eliminating the breeding places by drainage or by filling, and, in the case of large flood areas, by dyking and pumping. Filling and levelling of low places where water accumulates should be carried out wherever possible. The same also be taken in connection with breeding in water.
