LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

BUTTER FACTORY.—The Summerside butter factory began operations today. Success to it.

KAMLOOPS MINING CAMP.—From the press of Baillie & Bennett, Kamloops, B. C., comes an interesting pamphlet descriptive of the Kamloops Mining Camp and its resources and attractions. The pamphlet is appropriately illustrated, showing mining and ranching scenes, prominent citizens, etc. The literary work has been cleverly performed, and the letter-press is of the best description.

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian reports that the eldest son of Mr. Henry Scales, of St. Eleanors, aged about 11 years, met with a very serious accident on Saturday evening. While riding one of the horses with which he had been working in a field some distance from the house, he fell off, and getting entangled in the traces was dragged a considerable distance over the rough ground. When picked up it was found that his body was very badly bruised and torn the most serious wound being a cut in the groin some six inches in length and quite deep. Dr. McPhail, who was hastily summoned, dressed the wounds. The young man is still in a very critical condition.

THE LOBSTER FISHERY.—The Halifax Herald says: There are over seventy lobster canneries in operation this season on Cape Breton Island. The number of people engaged in this industry appears to be increasing year by year, and it is feared that if the canneries continue to increase in the future as in the past the fishery will ere long become depleted. In Little Bras d'Or district, where three canneries are in operation this season, the price of lobsters has been raised to \$2 per hundredweight. In consequence of this the codfishing industry has been abandoned, and nearly all fishermen are now engaged in catching lobsters. One man with his two boys is said to have netted \$70 last week in lobster fishing at Little Bras d'Or.

SHOT BY HIS WIFE.—An accident occurred last Sunday morning at Coburg, a mile or two out of Bay Verte, which may have fatal results. Robt. Chapman, of Chapman Settlement, was the victim. He and his wife were seated in their room, when the latter seeing a revolver, which had been in use the previous day, picked it up and playfully pointed it at her husband not knowing that it was loaded. It was discharged and the ball entered the husband's breast a few inches below his collar bone passing almost entirely through his body. Dr. Black was immediately summoned and succeeded in getting the bullet without any trouble. The wounded man is very low, but the doctor hopes to pull him through if no serious complication arise. Mr. Chapman is only about eighteen years old and has been married but a few months.—Post.

THE JUBILEE CELEBRATION.

Six.—I am informed that the train arrangements submitted by the jubilee programme committee only offer reduced fares for one day instead of three as it should be. I think, Mr. Editor, the Jubilee Committee should not accept the ridiculous train arrangements granted to the Exhibition Managers which allows people to come to the outskirts of the city. What we want is reduced fares for three days on railways and steamboats. In other cities the agents and superintendents of boats and railways seem to take an interest in civic prosperity, and on such occasions offer every convenience to visitors and advertise extensively. I think our hotel keeper and merchants, and traders generally should bestir themselves and insist upon obtaining similar treatment. I am also informed that fares were strongly objected to at the jubilee meeting and a resolution passed asking the Mayor and Councillor Nicholson to apply for better arrangement. I hope those gentlemen will act energetically in this matter and not agree to accept anything less than reduced fares for three days. S.
