## MEXICANS VS INDIANS.

**Two Battles Fought, One of the Best Officers on Mexican Side Killed.**

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 26.—Official reports of two battles between Mexican and Yakuis have just been received. General Luis Torres had declared the campaign suspended until October, but the Yakuis were not consulted on that point. Lorenzo Torres appears to have made different arrangements. On September 14th, Lorenzo Torres crossed the river to Vicala, a town supposed to have been captured by Luis Torres in August, and found the Indians. They attacked his rear guard and a running fight ensued. The report says the Indians were dispersed and nine killed. The Mexican loss was five killed and nine wounded, among the latter Lieut. Col. Navarec, of the 11th battalion, one of the best officers on the Mexican side.

The report of a battle on the 18th comes from another source, also official, and its statement of the number killed may be accepted. According to this report the forces under Col. Menaldez, number not stated, encountered 1,000 Indians near Zuacam, a small lagoon between Tonin and Potam. The Indians retired from the open field and sought cover in the thick woods, where the combat raged for more than two hours. The report says that the Indians were defeated and dispersed, leaving on the field 87 dead. The Mexican losses are stated as 14 killed and 36 wounded.

## Royalty in Squalor.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—Since his wife's death the Duke of Teck is said to have sunk into a pitiable condition. The tradesmen of Richmond refuse him credit until debts incurred by the late Duchess have been paid, and his name has been reported to the courts among those defaulting in their taxes. Broken mentally and physically the father-in-law of the Duke of York is living like a recluse in poverty and pathetic contrast to the splendor of his younger days.

## Springhill Strike Ended.

AMHERST, September 26.—Last evening a committee of the men waited on Mr. Cowans and the result of the conference was a settlement of the strike, the agreement being that trolleys are to be put on at once in No. 3 slope at 3.30 and in No. 2 slope at 4 o'clock for one month, after which time it is to be 3.30 p. m. Work was resumed this morning.

## The Action Approved.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—The decision not to allow the 48th Highlanders, of Toronto, to join in the celebration at New York in honor of Admiral Dewey's return is highly approved here.
