THE POOR HOUSE.

DEAR SIR,—Having had occasion to visit the Poor House of your city a short time ago, and through the kindness of Mr Allen, the keeper, shown the different wards, I conversed with several of the inmates, who spoke very highly of Mr. Allen, who, I think, is a gentleman in every respect.

But I regret to state that the condition of the Poor House of P. E. Island is a disgrace to any government or country of which the people claim to be Christians. Let any man, Liberal or Conservative, visit the Poor House and go through the different wards. He will find from fifteen to sixteen unfortunate beings huddled together in a small room containing besides the inmates fifteen or sixteen beds, or a bed for each inmate. Some of those beds are without pillows, and to add to the misery of the same among our unfortunate fellow beings they find themselves associated with lunatics and idiots. Of this class the Poor House has eleven, who should at once be removed to Falconwood, where they rightfully belong. I do not consider it fair on the part of any government to have such beings as this class under the care of the keeper of the Poor House—particularly when there are upwards of fifty inmates in such a building as the P. E. Island Poor House.

In my opinion, and I am sure the opinion of any right-thinking man, irrespective of his political feelings, it would have been far more commendable for the Farquharson Government to expend a small amount of the money used in corrupting the electors of Prince Edward island at the last general election in purchasing a farm near the city of Charlottetown where could be placed those unfortunate people to assist in earning their own living, and not be a burden on a certain class of people. Certainly they are not a burden on the present Government, for the simple reason that the Government takes no interest in their welfare.

Mr. Editor, I can assure you if those inmates of the Poor House had a vote they would not be smoking the offal from the Charlottetown tobacco factories. I would not be the least surprised to see those people smoking ten cent cigars and wearing plug hats such as one of our East Point candidates is wearing at present.

BLACKWELL, Mo., Dec. 5.—Two men, one about 50 and the other 20 years of age, supposed to have been drunks, appeared here during the night and were permitted to sleep in a boiler room. Death of a Litterateur.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—A special cable despatch to the Brooklyn Eagle from Rome says: "Mrs. Abby Sage Richardson, dramatist, poet, literary critic and translator, died in this city today. She was the widow of the late Albert Dean Richardson, newspaper man and author. Mrs. Richardson arrived here with her son, Wm Sage, the novelist, early in November, and her death was wholly unexpected by her friends in Rome."

The authorities at the archbishop's palace, when questioned about the matter, said they had heard nothing about it. A papal consistory will be held in Rome before New Year's, and it is expected that Archbishop Duhamel will then receive a cardinal's seat.

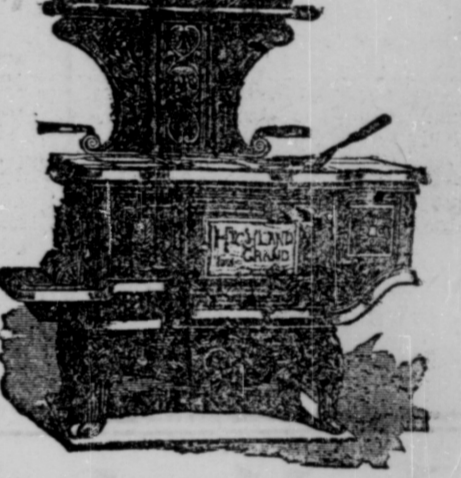
