Medically Speaking

CHILD'S FEET NEED REGULAR CHECK-UP

Like many ailments, foot ills often creep up on us virtually unnoticed. It's especially difficult to determine foot troubles in children because of their natural inclination to maintain silence about any ailment or body change which doesn't cause acute pain.

Generally, a youngster will report an ingrown toenail or a foot injury because it hurts. But the weakening of foot muscles and lowering of an arch may be so gradual that there is no discomfort until the trouble is beyond easy correction.

There are, however, certain early signs which might indicate trouble in the arch. These are: SOME WARNINGS

One is unwillingness to walk, run or play by a child who is normal in every other way. This might mean a weakening of foot and leg muscles.

Another sign is a tendency for the child's feet to "toe out," or a "bulging" of the ankles on the inner side of the feet.

Sometimes leg and foot trouble might indicate there is something wrong internally. For example, if the child's legs are bowed or knock-kneed, the feet are undernourished and he has a peculiar chest formation commonly called "pigeon breast," he might have rickets.
