

Orioles Shade Yanks 3-2; Pirates Defeat Phillies

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ted Williams caught up with teammate Earl Williams in the torrid American League batting race, each at a Friday night as they helped the Red Sox to two victories over Washington, 6-4 and 3-1. The night sweep jumped the Red Sox into third place ahead of Detroit, which lost to Cleveland, 5-4.

Williams went into the two games with a .324 average compared to Williams' .320. Williams knocked his 24th homer and a triple in three official trips in the first game and sat out the second. In the opener, rallied to two hits in five tries in the second contest.

The entire Griffith Stadium corps took out pencils and paper as the game ended and after 20 minutes of deliberation, figured their averages to the tenth decimal place and equal .322880645181.

Williams had 130 hits in 408 at-bats. Rupp has 180 hits in 550 times at bat.

NEW YORK (AP)—Baltimore Orioles, held to two hits for 11 innings, pushed across two 12th-inning runs for a 3-2 victory over Yankees Friday night. Hoyt Wilhelm, who no-hit the American League champions in his last start, went six hits and left with a 1-0 record in nine innings.

The Orioles scored their other two in the first inning on Joe Judge's inside-the-park homer.

That was the only hit and only base-runner allowed by southpaw Whitey Ford, the Yankees' probable first-game pitcher in next week's World Series. Ford, who struck out six, retired after six innings.

Ryne Duren and Art Ditmar were the other Yankee hurlers. CLEVELAND (AP)—Rocky Colavito drove in three runs Friday night with his 40th homer of the season and a ninth-inning single as Cleveland Indians defeated Detroit Tigers, 5-4.

Colavito's game-winning single came with the bases loaded, the score tied and nobody out. The hit brought his season's total of runs batted in to 110, second best in the league.

Detroit's Harvey Kuenn, who is third in the race for the American League batting championship, had two hits in four attempts.

Home runs also were belted by Larry Doby of Cleveland and Frank Bolling of Detroit. Colavito's two-run homer in the fifth made him the third Cleveland Indian in modern-day baseball to hit 40 home runs in a season. Hal Trosky hit 42 in 1936. Al Rosen hit 43, the club record, in 1953.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Milwaukee's Lew Burdette warmed up for the World Series Friday night by becoming a 20-game winner for the first time in his career as the National League champion Braves edged Cincinnati Reds 2-1.

The lanky right-hander claimed his 2-1 triumph by scattering nine hits. He has 10 defeats this year. Burdette's victory was not easy as the Braves were stopped on four hits by rookie lefthander Jim

O'Toole, making his major league debut, and reliever Hal Jeffcoat.

Milwaukee scored in the first inning on singles by Felix Mantilla and Joe Adcock. Del Crandall got home with the deciding run on an error after doubling in the second.

Singles by Smoky Burgess and Chuck Coles produced the Redlegs runs in the fifth.

CHICAGO (AP)—Rookie Barry Latman blanked Kansas City's A's with three hits Friday night to pitch Chicago White Sox to a 1-0 victory.

The hits, by Hector Lopez in the fourth and ninth and Harry Chiti in the eighth, all were singles. Not a Kansas City runner reached second.

In 47-2-3 innings since being recalled from Indianapolis, Latman has an earned run average of 0.75.

The Sox broke up a scoreless duel between Latman and Bob Grim in the sixth on singles by John Romano and Ron Jackson and a sacrifice fly by Johnny Callison.

WILL TRY AGAIN

Although Beaten Britain Not Giving Up The Ship

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP)—Great Britain, her America's Cup hopes sunk from under her, is not giving up the ship.

"I frankly don't think we shall ever give up trying for the cup," said Hugh Goodson, member of the syndicate which owns Sceptre, the British sloop whose challenge was defeated Friday.

"We're bitterly disappointed not winning the cup but we lost to a better boat," said Goodson after Sceptre lost her fourth straight race against Columbia, the American defender.

Sceptre joins a long fleet of frustrated challengers. Since the cup was established in 1851 seven challenges have been made to lift the cup from the New York Yacht Club. None has succeeded.

ADMIRAL CREW
"I'm a tremendous critic, but I have the greatest admiration for the way Sceptre's been handled by her crew."

Briggs Cunningham, Columbia's skipper, expressed similar feelings at a press conference at the Ida Lewis Yacht Club after coming ashore. But, said he, "It is disappointing she (Sceptre) didn't go any faster. It's sort of an anticlimax."

Goodson said "I'm pleased the cup series ended on such a happy note for everyone but us."

Ryff Outpoints Gale Kerwin

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lightweight Frankie Ryff took a beating in the last two rounds but had piled up more than enough of a lead with his crackling lefts to outpoint Gale Kerwin decisively in 10 rounds at Capitol Arena Friday night.

Kerwin, bleeding heavily from head cuts, tore into Ryff at the end but was unable to overcome the New Yorker's big edge.

The victory was the sixth in a row for Ryff, the once highly ranked lightweight who began a comeback last December after undergoing surgery to repair scar tissue over his eyes.

Kerwin, the Canadian welterweight champion, outweighed Frankie, 140-137. Ryff, however, had speed and a darting, punishing left.

Referee Eddie La Fond scored the lively skirmish for Ryff 94-65. Judge Joe Bunsu made it 95-69 and judge Mike Tardugno 96-63. The Associated Press gave Ryff a 94-69 margin.

Ryff, unmarked, dumped Kerwin for a bell-ending cut of five in the fourth and gashed the Ottawa-born welter high on the forehead and by the side of the left eye.

Frankie also raised a well near Kerwin's right eye, as his perpetually moving left kept close company with the Canadian's head.

Frick, Skiff Reported In Good Condition

BRONXVILLE, N.Y. (AP)—Baseball commissioner Ford Frick and New York Yankee scout Bill Skiff Wednesday both were reported in good condition at Lawrence Hospital.

Frick, 63, underwent an emergency appendectomy early Tuesday morning. He will not be able to attend the opening of the World Series at Milwaukee, Oct. 1.

Skiff, who suffered a skull fracture and a broken right knee in a fall, also will miss the Series. Skiff and a Johnny Neun had scouted Milwaukee Braves. After Skiff's injury, he was replaced by Eddie Lopez.

SET DATE FOR BRIDGE VANCOUVER (CP)—Construction on the Second Narrows Bridge, halted by a collapse that claimed 18 lives, is expected to be finished by July or August of next year, engineers estimated Thursday. The bridge, linking Vancouver with communities of the north shore of Burrard Inlet, was originally due to be completed by next June.

Thus they proved for themselves the right to advance against Parkdale, in competition for the Island Intermediate "B" Championship.

Whether or not the boys from Charlottetown knew the seriousness of the act they were performing I do not know. Undoubtedly, however, their coach must have known — as did several other people intimately concerned with the matter. Nevertheless, it was allowed to happen. If it would seem that those who should oppose any such unfair contest were the ones first to put their seals of approval on the matter.

Whether or not any mainland team who "knew the facts" would agree to play them, I can only guess. Sufficient it is to say that this unfortunate incident will undoubtedly have a very marked and very disastrous effect on intermediate baseball on Prince Edward Island. This is especially true in King's County all season and where you have several times commented on the large number of enthusiastic fans who assembled each week to give their favourite teams the support which meant so much.

King's County fans and players were extremely annoyed at the turn of events. I sincerely hope that such an act will never be repeated, and that it will not to greatly dishearten young baseball players outside of Charlottetown.

Team Denied Authority To Substitute Whites For Negroes

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Minor league baseball president George M. Trautman Wednesday denied Corpus Christi authority to substitute white players for Negroes in the event the Texas team meets Birmingham, Ala., in this year's Dixie Series.

A city ordinance in Birmingham prohibits Negroes and whites from participating in the same athletic contests there. Birmingham, winner of the Southern Association pennant, is scheduled to play the winner of the Texas League pennant in the Dixie series.

Austin was to meet Corpus Christi Wednesday night to decide the Texas League title. Officials of the Austin club said that if their team wins they will be willing to play the best-of-seven series in Austin or any neutral city. Birmingham said it cannot see its way clear to do so.

As a result, Trautman said, the Dixie playoff will be cancelled this year if Austin defeats Corpus Christi.

Jimmie Humphries, owner of the Corpus Christi club, offered to replace three Negroes on his team with white players if Corpus Christi earns a playoff berth. The Austin team has four Negro players.
