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## Acadia Campus Paper Ignores Furor Over Previous Edition

By THOMAS ORSZAG Canadian Press Correspondent WOLFVILLE, N.S. (CP) — The Acadia Athenaeum, the weekly student newspaper at Acadia University here, appeared as usual Friday but its columns contained no mention of the furor caused by an article in last week's issue.

The only reference to student journalism was buried in an item about a Maritime conference of the National Federation of Canadian University Students which opened here Friday.

Discussing recent NPCUS criticism of staff "firings" at La Rotonde, University of Ottawa student paper, the Athenaeum said: "It might be a good idea if at the NPCUS conference being held here the Maritimers look in their own backyards."

Meanwhile, Acadia President Dr. Watson Kirkconnell said the college plans no further action in the case of Athenaeum writer Robert Fiander, 27, of North Sydney, N.S., whom he suspended for an article he wrote in the Jan. 30 issue. The president called it "foolish blasphemy."

He also said he will take no action on the student council's reinstatement of Athenaeum editor Donald Angus, 21, of Bridgetown, N.S.

Angus had been suspended as editor by student council president Ian Forrest of Montreal. Associate editor Philip Roberts of Magog, Que., brought out this week's edition.

Dr. Kirkconnell, condemned Angus's action in publishing Fiander's piece as "an infringement on religious conscience."

The student council Thursday night turned down recommendations of a student disciplinary committee that Angus resign and that a censor board be set up to supervise the paper.

The president's statement that he contemplates no further action was taken to indicate the college will not impose formal expulsion of Fiander.

TOLD TO LEAVE TOW In his letter of suspension, Dr. Kirkconnell told Fiander to leave town within 24 hours. He said suspension followed "a long record of misbehavior."
